Taxation Increased \$650,000.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Whether it is right or not to blame old Adam for the sins and worries consequent upon the "apple incident," there can be no doubt that many of our anxieties in Newfoundland for years to come may properly be laid at the door of the Morris Government. The last scene is almost upon us. It is quite a different ending than that intended by Morris but the end has been foretold time and time again by you, Sir, in The Evening Telegram, and others of sane and unprejudiced mind, who have foreseen no other close to the carnival of extravagance of that Party than that to which the Government has been for the past months tending and which burst upon the public mind on the presentation of the Budget on Wednesday afternoon with a shock that makes men of every Party stop and think seriously where all this leads.

Outraging the business methods of the smallest shop on Water Street by cutting the revenue by \$350,000 last year, the Government now has to acknowledge its error and in repairing it this year has to tax the people \$650,000, nearly double what it took off last year.

Could incapacity go further? But what can be expected? There is not one Minister in the House capable of attacking any problem of finance. The contract with Reid shows this. Reid outmatched them easily. In a week prices on food-stuffs and clothing (a big item and almost totally unconsidered) will have advanced, and they will not only advance the price but the importer has to pay on his duty, but his profit on that as well.

Morris has dealt with the liquor question in a way typical of the man. No doubt he will assure the Temperance people that he is fighting the evil by putting a heavier duty on liquor and in a short while when the petitions for a plebiscite come in he will lament the fact that the country cannot afford to lose \$500,000 that it gets as a revenue on liquor. Yes, Morris has effectively settled the question of Prohibition for many years to come, and its advocates may just as well save their breath for their porridge.

The Good Book says "the way of the transgressor is hard," and true it is that Morris is travelling a hard and thorny way. We are reaping the consequences of four years of Morris rule and find (1) the Public Debt increased by nearly \$10,000,000; (2) The Public Debt practically empty; (3) an estimated four million railway policy costing double that amount; (4) no money for Agriculture; (5) no money to build light-houses and construct public works; (6) a deficit in the year's accounts and (7) \$270,000 added taxation to a people already overburdened.

I expect this will cause Hon. John Anderson to change his coat again. Too bad for all his years of explanation!

Pretty and Attractive Punch Work

All punch work must be done in hoops, and care should be taken that the threads lie straight and that the hoops fit snug.

Starting at the left-hand side, fasten your thread securely on the under side of the linen, and bring the needle up through the first dot of the second row. Put your needle into the first dot of the first row, and bring it up through the first dot in the second row. Now insert the needle into the first dot of the first row again and bring the thread across diagonally to the second dot of the second row. Repeat in the same manner across the two rows of dots. The second row of work connects the second and third rows of dots, and it worked just the same. When the entire space is worked in this direction turn the work and take the stitches at right angles to those already worked, thus forming the four-sided or each small square. This completes the punch work stitch, but one should practice first on some waste material as it is a very easy matter to draw the stitches unevenly, and this will produce a puckered effect outside of the punch work. A little wrinkle can scarcely be avoided, owing to the nature of the work. The tighter the stitches are drawn the more open and airy the result. When one has mastered this stitch, many and beautiful are the pieces on which it may be used.—Practical Needlework, in Woman's World for February.

Ethie Sailed To-Day.

The S.S. Ethie sailed at 7 a.m. to-day to take up the Placentia Bay service, calling at as many ports on the East Island route as ice conditions still permit. Should she be unable to enter Placentia on her return from the Bay she will come on here direct before sailing for the Westward. The ship left the dock at 4 p.m. yesterday, and so heavy was the ice, that at 9 a.m. she had only reached as far as St. John's and had to discontinue operations until daylight this morning.

Hanged at Calgary.

Murderer of a Farmer Pays the Penitence.
Calgary, Alt., Feb. 17.—William Jasper Collins, who confessed he killed John T. Benson, a farmer for whom he worked, but who later refused the confession, and fought extradition from Kingston, Mo., where he was arrested, was hanged in the jail yard here to-day.
Benson's house near Cereal was burned two years ago and his charred body was found in the ruins. Room after the funeral the authorities became suspicious when Collins disappeared. Later Collins was found in Alibon where he and Benson formerly had lived. He was found guilty last November. Robbery was supposed to have been the motive for the crime.

Village Slid Into River.

A serious landslide occurred recently in Keland Valley, Colombo, the side of a hill containing a small village falling bodily into the river. Twenty-five inhabitants, men, women and children, were drowned. There have been almost unprecedented rains in this part of the island; higher flood levels being reached than in 1904, hitherto the greatest flood year.
