A Florizel Passenger

Describes the Drowning of Fireman Babstock.

The following letter was received yesterday by a gentleman in town from Mr. Edward Rudolph, a representative of the Evening World, New York. Mr. Rudolph was here on a visit arriving by the Florizel; he was an eye-witness of the loss of the unfortunate fireman Babstock, which sad event, as our readers know, occurred this week.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 14, 16.

My Dear Sir,—You have probably heard about the drowning of Stanley Babstock, coal trimmer, who leaped overboard as the Florizel was passing out of the "gap" of St. John's last Saturday. Here are the facts and you may use them as you see fit: There had been trouble between certain coal trimmers before the Florizel threw off her passengers. Soon after the pilot left the vessel, Babstock appeared on the forward deck and acting as though his mind was unbalanced. His fellow workers collared him, when suddenly he broke away and ran over to the port rail. Before those near could take hold of him he jumped into the water. Capt. Martin, who was on the bridge with his officers, signalled to stop the vessel and ordered a lifeboat lowered. The lifeboat was cut away and a crew was soon making for Babstock who was about a hundred yards astern. As the boat pulled away another coal passer named Hearn jumped from the aft main deck. The lifeboat crew picked him up and then continued on to get Babstock. Then Whalen, a coal passer, was about to leap overboard but was pulled back over the rail by the deck steward and some passengers. Meantime the Florizel was compelled to make for the open sea owing to the narrowness of the entrance. Once outside Capt. Martin headed the Florizel back towards St. John's. It was seen that the lifeboat was returning in tow of the pilot motor boat, Babstock having gone to his fate. The Florizel hove to and the lifeboat was lifted to her davits. Let me say here that under the existing circumstances, a narrow entrance and a choppy sea, Capt. Martin, his officers and crew did everything possible to save Babstock. The passengers were high in their praise over the coolness of Capt. Martin and his officers, and the efforts they made to get the drowning man. Of course there was the usual excitement attending such an incident, but the passengers are satisfied that the drowning of Babstock was no fault of the steamer's company or officers and crew. There were other smaller boats nearer Babstock, but the men aboard them probably did not see him.

Canadian Captain

Looks for Speedy End of the War. The following letter was received by Mr. Robert French, of Harbor Grace, from a captain commanding a battalion of the Canadian Brigade to which Mr. French's son "Sandy" belongs:

France, 25/11/16.
Dear Mr. French,—Sandy just left here for his billet. I was so glad to see him. Although we are both in the same brigade it is remarkable how seldom we have been able to look and meet. Our first meeting was at Valenciennes, the next at Bailluet last January, and then we lost sight of one another until yesterday when he came over for a lecture and stayed to have a drink of "enthusiasm" with me. He tells me that Levi Verge and Arch Courage have been killed. I am very sorry indeed to hear that, and no doubt there have been a great many more of our boys knocked out in the Somme offensive. I reach of the out-coming of the four Ayres. How dreadful for the poor folks at home. One is brought in to think that there is something Christ-like in the sacrifice on the field and something God-like in the quiet grief at home, for one "Gave his life for his friends," and the other "Gave his only Son." How true it is that in this "War on War," the soldiers give their lives for their friends and the fathers and mothers are giving their only sons and more often than not their only two. Out here of course we do not think of our pain but that those at home, while you are always wondering how goes it with my boy in France. That makes the worry general and it is a question as to who is bearing the bigger load. Sandy looks well. He is a very big and healthy looking fellow and God help the Hun he marks for his man in a scrap. His platoon commander tells me that in the last fight (June 13th) your son distinguished himself and has been recommended for mention by his Colonel. I am sure you will be pleased to hear that.

Things are growing more lively every day. It portends the speedy end of the war, I hope. We have been at it a long time now and while one cannot imagine a war becoming monotonous, still, it is getting worisome for the old hands.
