

Consumers' League Proposed.

MEETING TO BE CALLED SHORT. Feels as young

The opinion that a lot of profiteer ing is going on in our midst, the ineffectual efforts of the Food Control Board, coupled with the ever-increas ing price of necessaries have led to a movement for the organization of a Consumers' League. This League was suggested at a recent public meeting and has since gathered considerable force. The idea of these behind the movement, is to have competent mer outside of trade, trade interests and politics, form a committee which may co-operate with the present Food Con trol Board, which as a body is thought to be without sufficient support. Housewives, being the principal buyers, will also be asked to interest themselves in the movement and will have much important work to do. A vigilance committee, which will watch and compare prices, charged in the different stores, reporting same to the central organization, will form an effective branch of the League. The committee will investigate costs in foreign markets, transportation charges, and profits made. A drastic and effectual law against profiteering with the cutting out of luxuries will also receive its consideration. It is asserted that there is to be found as much as 100% difference in prices charged in city stores for like articles. It is also said that there are business people here who have within the past two years accumulated fortunes at the expense of the public. Instances of people with small capital, banking from \$10,000 to \$20,000 in a very short period, are not wanting. The greatest grievance seems to be in the matter of dry goods and millinery, these articles, except to the experienced, are known as "blind," and therefore more likely to be "surcharged" than groceries or provisions. As a sample of heredity the story is told of a dissolute woman named Jukes, who was born in 1740, in the country now called the United States. She died a confirmed drunkard and some years ago there was a census made of her descendants then living and a history obtained of both the living and the dead. Of her seven hundred descendants-100 were illegitimate; 181 were women of the streets; 142 beggars; 4 were workhouse inmates and 76 criminals, from murderers to pickpockets. It is estimated that it cost the nation all told, \$1,200,000 to take care of this bad woman's descendants.
