

TODAY'S MESSAGES.

FATAL GUN ACCIDENT.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 10. Joseph Leiter, Jr., aged fourteen, son of Joseph Leiter, millionaire of Chicago and Washington, was killed today by the accidental discharge of a shot gun, while returning from a duck hunt near Leiter Camp, at Bateau Canard, near the mouth of the Mississippi River.

VALUABLE RECORDS DESTROYED.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 10. Priceless census records, dating back to 1790 when the first enumeration of the United States was taken, were destroyed to-night in a fire of undetermined origin, at the Department of Commerce. The census figures from every census up to the present one, and officials said it would be days before even an estimate of the damage could be given. The blaze originated in the basement of the Commerce Building and five alarms quickly brought every piece of apparatus in downtown Washington to the scene, and more than twenty feet of hose completed damage done to the records, by pouring tons of water through the windows into the vaults where the records were kept. During the two and half hours, which men fought blaze, three firemen were overcome by smoke and taken to hospital.

ORDERED TO LEAVE PERSIA.

LONDON, Jan. 10. The British Legation in Teheran, Persia, has ordered the immediate evacuation by British women and children of Persia, in view of the announced withdrawal of British forces from North West Persia, and its threatened sequel, a Bolshevik invasion, as a despatch to the Daily Mail from Teheran. The despatch adds that all foreign Legations and Nationals, and the Shah, with his court, will leave Persia in the spring.

BARRACKS ATTACKED.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11. The police barracks at Longwood, near Mervin, was attacked Saturday night. It was officially reported yesterday afternoon. The fight lasted for an hour, when the attacking forces retired. The police sustained no casualties.

UNIQUE BOYCOTT.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11. Wexford County Council, composed of Republicans, has adopted a resolution unanimously calling on the General Council of the Irish Council to call to start a campaign for the prohibition of liquor and tobacco, in order to deprive the Imperial Government of its main source of revenue.

POLICE SHOOT CITIZENS.

DUBLIN, Jan. 11. Early last night, James Farrell was shot dead, and Thomas Connolly severely wounded in North Brunswick Street here, by auxiliary police. A semi-official report says the officers were fired on, whereupon one of them drew a revolver and returned the fire.

FOREIGN INAUROURAL CELEBRATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. The abandonment of all plans for the celebration in connection with the inauguration of President-Elect Harding was announced last night by E. H. MacLean, Chairman of the Inaugural Committee, in accordance with the desire of Mr. Harding, who personally made the request in the interest of national thrift.

SHIPBUILDING DECREASE.

LONDON, Jan. 11. Returns by Lloyd's, for the quarter ending December 31, show a decrease of shipbuilding as compared with the previous quarter. The total world's tonnage under construction is seven million, one hundred and seventy-eight thousand, seven hundred and eighty-five tons, down from eight million, one hundred and thirty-five thousand, three hundred and thirty-five tons, at the end of the September quarter, the drop being due to a decline in building in the United States.

KRUPPS ISSUING NEW SHARES.

LONDON, Jan. 11. The Times today prints a report from Essen that the Krupp Company will shortly issue new shares to the amount of two hundred and fifty million marks.

PROMINENT FINANCIER DEAD.

LONDON, Jan. 11. John Blair Macfarlane, banker and director of many corporations, widely known in the United States, died here this morning at seven o'clock, following an abdominal operation. Macfarlane was born in St. John's, Nfld., in 1861, and went to Philadelphia when quite young, and attended school there. He had a varied career, being successively lawyer, engineer and financier. He was Chairman of the board of Directors of the British American Continental Bank, which suspended payment on January 6th.

LENINE ILL.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. Nikolai Lenin, Premier of Soviet Russia, is dangerously ill at Moscow, according to a wireless from Berlin to the Jewish News Bureau here. The message said three German specialists are now on the way to Moscow for consultation.

WANTS COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT.

HAGUE, Jan. 11. The Russian Soviet Government is making efforts to reach a commercial agreement with Holland. According to newspapers Leend Krassin is seeking to visit this country, but the Associated Press is informed that Krassin is not likely to get a passport.

S. O. S. SIGNALS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. Wireless distress signals calling for help at "the first possible moment" were picked up here today from the Norwegian steamer Ontanda, which left here for Vazdaal, Norway, on Jan. 1, carrying a general cargo. The position given is between twelve and fifteen hundred miles from New York. A message picked up from the British freighter Philadelphia, said she was rushing to the assistance of Ontanda.

Heavy Ice Looked For.

Word has been received from St. John's, Nfld., that steamers plying on the eastern route from the capital to the Labrador coast, have encountered heavy and ice. Marine experts predict heavy fogs from the Arctic next spring, giving as their reason for this, the fact that unusually warm weather prevailed in the summer of 1920, with the result that huge fields of ice and bergs broke away from the great northern glaciers and these will later come south with the flow of the northern current—Sydney Post.



State Lotteries

Established in England

The Government of Queen Elizabeth's time followed the example of the Italians and set up public lotteries as a means of putting money into the Treasury, and on January 11, the west doors of St. Paul's Cathedral. There were so many tickets to be drawn that the office had to be kept open day and night, until the following May. These State lotteries existed, with intervals, from that time till the beginning of the nineteenth century, when the whole affair had become such an abuse, that an Act of Parliament was passed rendering all such proceedings illegal. But the State lotteries which were occasionally offered and given, there were smaller ones of ten pounds. It is said that the idle and dissolute after winning one of these prizes became more idle and dissolute than ever, whilst those who drew blanks, and who had sold their goods in order to get money to buy fresh chances. Officers similar to those of our stockbrokers were coiled all over the City, their proprietors negotiating chances and re-purchasing tickets for numerous clients. Many of them being of the fair sex. The difference between these State lotteries and the more recently suggested Prize Bonds is that in the latter case there would be no gambling in one sense, because the holders would not lose their money even if they did not gain a prize, the bonds being returnable plus interest at frequent drawings—the addition of prizes would simply be the inducement to lend money to the State in place of high interest.

Erect Snow Fences.

A CALL TO THE COUNCIL.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—The snow storm of the past few days has given the city another object lesson of the need for traffic, the comfort and health of the people in obtaining supplies, medical assistance, etc., also the protection of their property against fire, demands that the streets be kept open.

A visit to the Western end of Le Marchant Road will convince one and all that the time has now come to devise means for preventing the blockade of that important thoroughfare, which is the main highway for the larger portion of the city. To-day, a snow bank at least 12 feet deep covers the full width of the road and all traffic is stopped. It will be necessary for the Council to spend a large amount of money to open up this road so that the fire department and regular traffic can get through, otherwise if the town is menaced by a possible conflagration, houses located within the "blocked" area have no fire protection.

I would respectfully suggest that the Municipal Council study the situation as it pertains to this and other streets such as Military Road, Allandale Road, etc., and plan to erect temporary snow fences (such as are used along the railway line) during the month of December. If such a fence was erected on the northern side of Le Marchant Road to stop the ground drift off Buckmaster's Field, I believe the trouble would be greatly minimized and probably cured until the property referred to is protected by houses. The Eastern end of the road, which is always open, is proof of the value of
