The Road to Peace Held By Allies.

They Have But to Recognise Turkey—U. S. Ambassador's Speech Sharply Criticised—King George Entertains German Envoy.

ALL THROWS ONUS ON ALLIES

CONSTANTINOPLE, Mar. 1. Mustafa Kemal Pasha, Turkish leader declared at today's session of the Grand National Assembly that the issue of peace was in the hands of the Allies who had only to recognize Turkey's judicial and economic independence. He said it was necessary to end the constant arguments and terminate the negotiations as rapidly as possible.

AMERICAN SPEECH CRITICIZED.

LONDON, Mar. 1. Ambassador Harvey's speech of last night in which he dismissed the British cause and nature of the British war indebtedness to the United States evoked expressions of displeasure in British official circles today and gives indication of considerable discussion. The Foreign Office declined to comment on the address but it is reliably stated that Ambassador Harvey's remarks, particularly when, as the case was, he virtually challenged the British Government to issue a statement regarding the Balfour note of last year, were considered unusual for an envoy.

NEWFOUNDLANDER KILLED AT ST. JOHN, N.B.

LONDON, Mar. 1. Thomas Martin was buried under a pile which caved in at the Atlantic Sugar Refineries today, and after being dug out and rushed to hospital. He was about twenty-one years of age and had been in Newfoundland for seven months ago. One of his relatives in Newfoundland, Andrew Martin, in Lynn.

GERMAN EMBASSY IN LONDON

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1. The German Embassy in a formal statement issued today, declared that the population in the Ruhr, although severely tried, let itself be led into a state of desperation, the German Government, owing to paralysis by

the French of German official apparatus in Ruhr, will not be in a position to guarantee the maintenance of peace and order in the occupied territory. "Owing to the latest events in Ruhr, especially owing to the ever more numerous and brutal expulsions, sentences by court martial, pillages, and ill-treatments in the streets, and through oppressions of entire towns such as Ricklinghausen, Gelsenkirchen and Bochum, an atmosphere of high tension has gradually been created in the entire occupied territory which causes the possibility to be feared that this may lead to explosions. The German Government still maintains a policy of mere passive resistance as hitherto applied, and in this policy is backed by the unanimous support of officials and the entire population."

FINLAND WANTS HER DEBT REFINANCED.

WASHINGTON, March 1. Finland will to-morrow begin preliminary conversations with the United States on the refunding of the Finnish debt, amounting to over eight million, two hundred thousand dollars, and interest of one million, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

GERMAN AMBASSADOR LUNCHEONS WITH KING.

For the first time since the war the German Ambassador, Dr. Gustave St. Hammer and wife, lunched with the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace today.

EIGHT MILLION DOLLARS ONLY.

LONDON, March 1. Ex-Premier Asquith, as arbitrator of the difficulties between the British and Canadian Governments relating to an adjustment of debts standing over from the war, handed down a decision awarding Canada eight million dollars. The Dominion claimed thirty-two millions.

CAMERON ELECTED BY ACCLIMATION.

BADDECK, March 1. Hon. D. A. Cameron, Provincial

Secretary of Nova Scotia, was declared elected for Victoria County at the nomination proceedings here to-day. He succeeds former Premier George Murray.

LIBERAL ELECTED.

WINDSOR, Ont., March 1. After one of the hottest election contests in the history of the Riding, Albert Healey, Liberal, was elected to succeed the late Hon. W. C. Kennedy, Minister of Railways, in North Essex, a Federal seat. He won over Lieut.-Col. S. C. Robinson, Conservative, by a majority of approximately 1,600. Kennedy's majority in 1921 was more than seven thousand.

America Should Join the League of Nations.

Dr. Grenfell Talks to Large Audience—League is a Democracy.

"America heading toward Spiritual Suicide" as long as she remains out of the League, noted traveller says.

The League of Nations is essential to permanent peace in this world and just so long as America remains out of it, "she is heading toward spiritual suicide," was one of the assertions of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, international figure and well known traveller and lecturer who spoke yesterday afternoon to a large gathering of people at the home of General and Mrs. M. L. Bonham, on Greenville Street and during the evening at Anderson's College. Dr. Grenfell spoke here under the auspices of the Anderson County Tuberculosis Association, which organization was responsible for his coming to this city. Dr. Grenfell discussed freely on matters of international moment, impressing his hearers with his logical views and conclusions based upon his wide experience and diligent study of world problems. The eminent lecturer talked for more than an hour, every minute of which was devoted to the discussion of some timely topic of international importance. Dr. Grenfell is a speaker of great ability, and interesting entertainer and a thinker whose conclusions are based entirely, it appears, upon the result of his study in foreign countries of the matters which he discussed.

FAULTS AND VIRTUES.

Primarily, Dr. Grenfell's talk during the afternoon, was a discussion of the League of Nations; its faults and virtues, and the various angles from which it is viewed by the countries of the globe. The spirit of democracy which exists among the delegates from the various nations affiliated with the League, is characteristic of the fundamental principles for which such an international organization must stand. As an example of the attitude of delegates to the League, Dr. Grenfell stated that when he was in Geneva, he was informed that any spectator might approach any one of the delegates to the League, directing to him any question on any matter concerning the work of the League, without the feeling that the delegates were aloof, or in any sense sought to carry on the business of the nations which they represented, under cover, so to speak. Dr. Grenfell stated that he was impressed also by the fact that a measure voted upon

by the delegates, before being adopted by the League, must be voted upon unanimously, the sense of the body of international notables apparently being that a dissenting vote was a thorn in the flesh of the measure as well as the League and would remain so, as long as the views of the Delegates were not in harmony with those of the League.

U.S.A. SHOULD JOIN.

"Every day that goes by is strengthening the League—that is certain," declared Dr. Grenfell. "They want to call it an Association of Nations, or by some other name not connected with Mr. Wilson," adding that "the League has suffered by America's not having entered into it. With America in the League, the other Nations that have entered into would feel an additional confidence that is lacking. The League is essential to permanent peace and as long as America keeps out of it, she is heading toward spiritual suicide," declared the speaker. Questioned as to the feasibility of the League's taking over the situation between France and Germany, Dr. Grenfell asserted that he was of the opinion that if Germany had been in the League the present status of things would have been averted. It is his belief that the League would have the moral support of the world at

In concluding his talk, Dr. Grenfell stated that "the League is by no means a perfect institution, but still it is willing to be promoted and excited," he said, to meet with the approval of the nations of the earth.

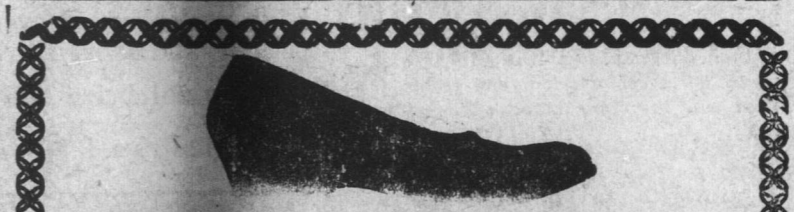
Battling Siki's Plans.
