PUBLIC NOTICE.

The attention of the public is called to the following provisions of Section 44, Chapter 129, Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland, which provide that no person being the holder of a grant, lease or license of a right of way or of a right of way for timber or pulp purposes under an Act of the Legislature, or under any contract with the Government, or as the assignee of such person, his servant or agents, contractors or subcontractors, shall cut, dig, or remove any Crown lands other than defined in the said grant, lease or license, or shall purchase timber cut on such lands under a penalty of twenty dollars for every tree cut, to be recovered by suit, in the name of the Minister of Agriculture and Mines, in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice.

Market News

(Trade Review.)

Codfish—Foreign and local market conditions remain unchanged during the week. Daily some codfish came from the North and West, but nothing like the volume which came here in October, and labour along the waterfront is not as much in evidence. Prices in the European markets seem to be "ragging," which is only natural at this time of the year when supplies are getting plentiful on the other side. Most exporters do not look for any great congestion of the markets, and the hope is expressed that such an unfortunate condition of affairs will be entirely obviated this year. All are now afraid that there will be a shortage of shore fish this year, and this eventually will make for higher prices for the class of fish. Owing to the fine mild weather which has prevailed for some time past, a good deal of fish is still being caught in different places north and west, but cannot be cured until the spring and will be marketed next season. Keen observers do not hesitate to say that trade has been a good deal better this season than last year, and many consider this an augury of better times to come and the beginning of a return to our former state of prosperity even though the recovery be gradual. The consumption of our fish in the Oporto market continues good. The report received by the Board of Trade this week gives the stocks of Nfld. fish as 16,175 qtls. with 6,817 qtls. consumption and little Norwegian held there. Eight or ten vessels have been entered to load at different places for Europe, Brazil, and the West Indies as well as a couple of steamers, and the clearances for the week were:—"Mayenne" Henne-gar, Port Union for Kingston, Jan. with 1,654 qtls. codfish and 250 brls. herring; "W. W. McIntosh," Sandy Point, 125 brls. herring, 69 brls. green fish, 30 qtls. dry fish, and 4 casks cod oil for Halifax, and the "Enid E. Legge," Burgeo, 3,771 qtls. Burgeo & LaPelle Export Co. for Pernambuco. By S.S. Rosalia there was shipped, via New York 600 qtls. fish to Italy, 3,175 qtls. to B.V.I., 14 qtls. to Canada, and 1,667 qtls. to the United States, as well as 16 1/2 tons cod oil and 887 seal skins, while S.S. Harmony for England took 53 tons seal oil and 15 tons cod oil.

Common Cod Oil—Local market has gone very quiet during the past week. There are only a few small lots arriving. The principal dealers have all disposed of their holdings. The stocks are in very small compass. Enquiries are still coming in from England, and there is no doubt whatever that all the Oil put up in Newfoundland this season will be wanted at full market prices.

Cod Liver Oil—It is reported that the Government have put forward a very strong request to Premier Warren, who is now in London, to get the British Government to give a preference in favour of this Oil in their scheme for preferential tariffs to help trade within the Empire. Cod Liver Oil is an article that is wanted in every one of the Dominions as well as the British market, and if the Old Country would grant a preference, the other dominions are sure to follow. Report says that Premier Warren has good expectations that this will be carried out, but every subject in England has been overshadowed for the present by their elections to take place early next month. With a preference of this kind there would be splendid possibilities to work up the Cod Liver Oil industry to advantage in this country.

Flour—The conditions of this market show no material change. There is necessarily much activity in flour, owing to the demands of the fishermen, who have "put off" their catches in St. John's, and a good deal is being shipped by various consignors to different parts of the country. Heavy shipments are coming along and will continue to do so, as after another week or ten days navigation on the St. Lawrence will be closed. Though a firm market is looked for, the balance of the year there is every possibility of a decline in prices by mid-winter, as despite adverse conditions and resultant damage before the crops were gleaned, the yield of wheat this year was large, and what there is an assurance that the heavy European demand prices must necessarily drop a few points. Prices wholesale are the same as last week, \$7.80 to \$8.30 per barrel. The imports of flour for the week were 2,750 brls. by the Sable I. and considerable consignments by the Sable from New York and Halifax.

Pork—Europe is still buying heavily of this goods and all qualities are of the up grade, especially Fat Back, for which there is a constantly growing demand. Dealers tell us that figures for Pork all the coming winter will be pretty high, and it will be somewhat difficult to secure. The stocks which the Newfoundland market requires. It is understood that hogs are not obtainable in the numbers desired at the great packing centers in the United States and that this in a great measure is the cause of the recent price for this article.

Beef—Beef seems to hold the same tendency as Pork, and the price of the various grades is steadily in the ascendant. There is a large and increasing demand in Europe, and the people of the United States are con-

suming more of this commodity than ever before. Dealers are not surprised at the steady advance in figures and do not think there will be an alteration in this aspect for a long while to come. The demand in the great American packing houses still continues, and the local market seems to be very active so that any decline in quotations cannot be looked for until the American and European situation becomes easier. Prices according to quality required vary from \$21.50 to \$25.00 per barrel wholesale. The imports for the week were 205 brls. by the Sable I. from Halifax and some also by the Silvia from Halifax and New York.

Sugar—It looks now as if sugar will take on a downward trend and lower prices will be a feature of the market as the Fall season merges into winter. The Cuban crop though not a record as to quantity has been very large, and this coupled with the fact that the amount of raw sugar remaining over was small, is justification for the belief that the price of this class of goods will reach the minimum early, possibly sooner than most dealers expect. Anyhow many in the trade look for cheaper sugar during the winter months. The price at present in the local market is \$2.50 per hundred pounds wholesale, while the market is steady and the demand fairly good.

Lobsters and Salmon—There is little or nothing of lobsters now left in stock here, nor is there any to come in from the outports. The market is pretty clear of this product and about the last goods available for shipment went forward to New York by Rosalia Saturday week. Business people here believe there is an excellent opportunity offering now to make up a splendid trade in Canned Salmon in the English market, owing to the placing of this class of goods on the free list. Once the British public sample our goods they cannot but acknowledge its superiority and buy largely of it. Enterprising people should hasten themselves to place our goods on the Home market quickly.

Hay and Oats—There is a fair quantity of these goods now coming into the local market, and it is likely that the first shipment to be received from P.E.I. will arrive by the Monas now in port. The market is quiet for both lines of goods and no extra demand may be looked for for another few weeks. Ships due to arrive in that time should carry large consignments of these goods which will be ample stocks for winter consumption. No shipments were received during the week and the price quoted for hay during last week, viz: \$27.00 the ton, still holds.

Miscellaneous—Among the miscellaneous imports were 4,600 tons coal by the steamer Carmen Erholme, 170 casks kerosene oil, oatmeal, butter, cheese, feeds, etc.
