Outbreak of Scarlet Fever

Medical Health Officer Dr. Brohm has received word of a serious outbreak of scarlet fever in Placentia Bay. The places affected are Odein, Baine Harbor and St. Joseph's. Two deaths have been reported, spread of the disease and Dr. Templeman has been despatched to render aid. The epidemic, which has been more or less prevalent in the city during the past couple of months, shows signs of abating, fewer cases being reported for the past week than for some time previously.
