Campaign in St. John's East Opened

Distriet Lineup for Monroe and Clean Government—Higgins Vinloombie and Fox Endorsed.

The clean up banner of Monroe and the Liberal-Conservative party was unfurled last night in St. John's East when the large audience which filled the C.C.C. Hall endorsed the candidates Monroe, Higgins, Vinloombie and Fox.

The meeting opened with the appointment of a chairman. By a unanimous vote, Mr. J. C. Gould was elected. He thanked the meeting for the confidence placed in him and then outlined the purpose of the meeting.

WILL CONDUCT CLEAN CAMPAIGN.

Mr. Higgins, who was the first called on to speak, was greeted with all the old time enthusiasm. After thanking all for their attendance at such short notice and complimenting them for their choice of a chairman, he outlined the nature of the campaign they were embarking on. He pledged himself to a fight where personalities and abuse will be left entirely to the other side.

WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN GOVERNMENT.

Mr. Higgins explained that the vote of want of confidence supporter by the Opposition was not want of confidence in individual members but rather in the government as it was then constituted.

Following this the speaker told how Mr. Warren tried to form a government with the help of the Opposition. They decided to help but on finding that the F.P.U. was the dominant factor the Opposition refused to be a party to the make-up. The government as it is now going to the country has this feature that it can only retain power by the will of the dominating influence which has wrecked such havoc in the past. The present and future must be judged by the record of the past. During recent years men have gone into the House of Assembly at the will and whim of an organization. We cannot hope to have a free assembly unless every man who goes in there is free to vote as he thinks is right. The group under Hickman can spell nothing but a repetition of the affairs of the past. Mr. Monroe and his party are opposed to this form of government and there is nothing left to do but to fight it to a finish.

THE COST OF COCKERISM.

The dominating influence has been the cause of adding \$20,000,000 to the public debt, and the load is now so great that a halt has to be called. Within the past few years the cost of running the country has jumped from four millions to ten millions and the same number of people have to carry the load. The population of the country has not increased. We have now come to the position when this state of affairs has got to stop and there is only one way to do it and that is by returning to constitutional methods. The country can be brought back to the House of Commons with a sufficient majority to enforce the desired reforms. There is only one issue and that is the domination of Cockerism. This cannot be tolerated longer.

STRAIGHT TICKET VOTE.

Mr. Higgins urged on all the necessity of a straight ticket vote for the Monroe policy. Mr. Higgins announced that as the campaign was to be a short one, he was going to leave the bigger part of the work in the city to the committee in whom he had the greatest confidence.

DENOUNCES PROPAGANDA TO SPLIT VOTES.

Mr. N. J. Vinloombie being called on to speak expressed his thanks to the meeting for endorsing him as a candidate. Mr. Vinloombie spoke of the propaganda which is being circulated to the effect that St. John's East has always been in Opposition and that it is time to have a representative in the government. This is being circulated for one purpose, only, that is to have the electorate split their votes but he felt that the men of the district had sufficient confidence in them to again do as they had done in the past two elections. He urged upon all the necessity of taking a part in the fight for Clean Government.

SINCERITY OF PURPOSE.

Sincerity of purpose was wanted and in this the people would have in Mr. Walter Monroe a leader who is an outstanding example. The leader whom they are following is a modest unassuming business man who is out for one set purpose, the saving of the country and in this he will be powerless unless he has a following large enough to bring about the needed reforms. The time has come when the people of Newfoundland must forget past afflictions and unite to prevent a recurrence of the conditions of the past. Since they had entered into politics his colleagues and himself were out for one principle

and it is in support of that principle they are out to-day. He felt certain that the electors would do as they always did, and when polling day comes, the vote rolled up for the St. John's East candidate will be the largest in the history of the district. The people are accused over the appalling state of the country and are determined to have a change.

Mr. C. J. Fox spoke next and expressed his appreciation of being nominated for the third time as a candidate for the district. He gave his assurance that the pledge to fight a campaign worthy of the district would be fulfilled. He and his colleagues would wage a hard but clean fight. When the political history of the years 1923-24 will be written it will be set down as the most eventful yet most tragic times in the country's annals. Newfoundland is now against the ropes and she has gone to the very limit of her resources with an overburden of twenty million dollars, her credit must soon cease and there is only one way to save the situation and that is by rendering the country productive.

NEEDS CHANCE TO REHABILITATE.

The country must be made self-sustaining the wheels or progress must be allowed to revolve. The country has the resources, she has the forests, the minerals, everything that goes to make success.

A MENACE TO THE COUNTRY.

The speaker next dealt with the cause of the troubles with which the country is faced. He had no objection to Sir Wm. Coaker in his personal capacity would give him credit for what he had done outside of politics. He had formed a great organization which would have done much good if it had continued in the policy under which it was organized. The F.P.U. was formed as an anti-political non-political organization. But Mr. Coaker has prostituted the end for which the union was created and today the F.P.U. as a political factor is the greatest menace that ever faced the country.

THE REAL FIGHT TO-DAY IS FOR THE INDEPENDENCE OF THE LEGISLATURE.

The Opposition party is now formed up under the leadership of Monroe a man who is above all suspicion, and to prove it he has gone to fight the election in the very root of Cockerism.

A CLEAN UP POLICY.

Every man in the Monroe party is pledged to a clean up policy. Every dark place must be illuminated and made pure and having been made pure, it must be kept pure. A square deal must be given to all. No one section of the people must benefit at the expense of others, we must have government of the people, by the people and for the people. Every Newfoundland must stand together and pull as one to get the country out of the position which she is in.

He had heard the candidates announce they were out for a clean fight, which was a very good thing. He had always fought clean, but he had begun to think it was time to have a try at the other way.

The Crooks organ had started a campaign of vilification and had been caught napping with the consequences that they will have to answer to the Supreme Court. The snake of Cockerism has to be killed and he had joined in the fight with Mr. Monroe to effect that result. He felt assured that Mr. Monroe had gone forth to victory and the message received, telling of the first meeting held, confirmed him in this belief.

SPENDTHRIFT TO CLEAN UP.

Since 1919 twenty millions have been spent in the country and there is nothing to show for it. And now the spendthrifts were going to clean up. If there was apparent good from the money wasted it would not be so bad, but in spite of all the young manhood is drifting out of the country, many of whom will never return, it is all caused by an incapable captain and crew.

THE FISH BONUS.

Sir John said he had read the manifestos of the leaders in the present campaign as regards the bonus on codfish. Mr. Hickman has promised a bonus on well made fish, and Sir John wondered if by this is meant that Sir William Coaker has in mind more ideas with regard to the fishery, he feared that some other policy similar to the infamous regulations was being contemplated. Mr. Monroe has promised a bonus on fish if it is needed, nothing can be clearer than this. The fisheries of this country must be preserved and unless steps are taken to care for them the country must suffer. The Monroe policy is straight from the shoulder. Sir John felt that when the result of the election is announced it will be seen that the districts of St. John's East and West will have recorded their faith in the policy of Monroe and Clean Government.

NEED FOR SERIOUS CONSIDERATION.

Mr. Fred Ayre who was at the meeting was invited to the platform and asked to make an address. He had listened attentively to the various speakers and was glad to note they had avoided all personalities. He was not entirely in accord with that, handling the present administration a government, he thought they should be termed "the what will you give me" crowd. The state of the country to-day calls for serious consideration, and it may lead to chaos later on, if something is not done very quickly. It is to every voter in the country to do his best to change present conditions and the only sure way to do it is by electing men who are pledged to introduce reforms. He is not a politician nor had he any desire to enter into politics but as one interested in the country he would do everything in his power to defeat the ends of those now in control of affairs. He was sure that the voters of St. John's East was of the same mind and that they would rally round and elect the candidates who are out for the reform.

This finished the meeting which closed with the National Anthem. After the regular business many men came forward and entered their names as a committee and the chairman announced that from now on the rooms would be open for regular committee work.
