

Historical Records ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

(H. F. SHORTIS.) Article XIV. HARBOR GRACE, March 17, 1832. The sealers are all safely away and the Festival of St. Patrick must be observed, and on this date the members of the Benevolent Irish Society held a reunion.

The "Waterford Arms" Hotel 1 again brought into requisition, and at 6 o'clock about 40 gentlemen, consist ing of members and invited guests, sit down to a table furnished with the choicest and rarest delicacies of the season, and the room arranged and decorated in a most beautiful style The room was adorned with appropriate ornaments, amongst which were a full length picture of Ireland's Titular Saint-the immortal St. Patrick. The ceiling was hung with wreaths and festoons, the walls beautifully embellished with oil paintings of picturesque scenery, and the whole lighted up with dazzling splendour. Amongst the persons present were Robert Pack, of Carbonear, John Starke and James Bayley, who each addressed the meeting in a few eloquent and complimentary remarks. Dr. William Stirling, President, took the chair, and was supported on the right by the Very Rev. Father Ewer, Rev. Dr. Macklin sat on his oft. Mr. Wm. Innott assisted as Vice-President, supported by Rev. Father Nowlan and Rev. Father Berney.
