Fire, which is supposed to have originated from a coal oil heater, was the cause of his death. Smoke was noticed coming from Mr. Morgan's room and when investigated his body was found badly burned. The remains were immediately removed to another room and the dead man's two sisters were afterwards saved with difficulty. The fire is thought to have originated about 11 o'clock that morning. The late Mr. Morgan was for many years a teacher, beginning his career in this profession at Sands Schoolhouse 55 years ago. He was a graduate master of arts and taught in the Port Dover High School for some time when he went, partially deaf. When this misfortune overtook him he deserted teaching and entered journalism. Mr. Morgan was for 38 years editor and proprietor of the Port Dover Maple Leaf and had only given up the position last September. He is conceded to be one of the best masters of the English language in Canada. Besides the two sisters, with whom he had lived in Port Dover, he is survived by one brother, Crosbie, also of Port Dover. The deceased was in his 73rd year was a member of the Masonic fraternity and an Anglican in religion.
