Forest fires cost Onondaga county \$30,000. Mount Pleasant is to have a public recreation park. Marquette's waterworks improvements cost the city \$75,000.

The corner stone of the new Masonic temple at Bay City will be laid June 24 with appropriate pomp and ceremony. Rev. S. M. Eastman, 80 years of age, for 45 years minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died at his home at Rome Sunday.

Mason voted in favor of bonding the city for \$35,000 for waterworks. There were 491 votes cast and only 55 against the improvement.

Norway is not large, but she is to have a school house that is to cost \$18,000. This means \$1.80 for each man, woman and child in the town.
