A VERY DRY MONTH.

And September Will Probably Bring a

Copious Rainfall. In connection with the long continued August drought Hugh V. Payne, of the Toronto observatory, has this to say: 'This month we have only had .36 inches of rain, but this is not unprecedented, because in 1874 the total rainfall for August was only .38, and in 1876 only a few drops of rain fell during the whole month. In 1889 the total rainfall for August was .42. These," continued Mr. Payne, "are the dryest spells recorded in fifty years. The drought of 1874 was tollowed in September by a rainfall of 11 inches, the dry August of 1876 by a rainfall in September of 24 inches, and the 1889 dry spell by a September rainfall of 2 inches.

"We are likely," said Mr. Payne, "to have 2 or 21 inches of rain next month. It will he found by those who have kept a record that no rain has fallen here until today since the night of August 1. While there have been occasional rains in Northern Ontario this month, the southern part of the Province has been completely dry. They have been a little better off in the extreme southwest of the Province."

CARAVELLA'S COMPLAINT
