

About Sugar Beets.

Farm and Home, of Springfield, Mass., contains the following letter

from H. C. Green, of London: A rousing meeting of 150 citizens of London, Ont., was recently held to consider the sugar beet proposition. Editor Burgendorf, of the Sugar Beet Journal, of Michigan, gave an address on the subject. A committee was appointed to see what acreage could probably be secured from farmers tor planting beets. During the meeting it was brought out that a factory building would cost \$100,000 and the machinery \$400,000, and would require 500 beets. Such a factory would acres give employment to 250 to 300 men hree to five months of the year, working night and day. A refinery would require 40 acres for grounds, would use 60,000 tons of soft coal each year, 2,000,000 gallons of water every 24 hours, 5,000 tons of lime rock and 600 tons coke. The committee of investigation will report at a subsequent meeting at an early date. • • While the citizens of London, Ont., are bound to have a beet sugar factory, it will probably not be erected until next year, as it is now too late to build for this year's crop, or for contracts to be made with farmers to grow the crop. The citizens of the city, how-ever, have offered nearly \$300, divided into prizes of from \$1 to \$15, for the best sugar beets grown in Middlesex county this year. The Provincial Government offered seed free, and will send a man with instructions how to grow a crop, provided 40 farmers with-in a radius of five miles of the city will agree to grow one-eighth to oneguarter of an acre. It is estimated five acres of sugar beets will make a

larger profit than twenty acres of any kind of grain.
