German dueling with the pistol is not the joke that it often is in France. It is cold-blooded murder. The Germans shoot to kill and the quickest trigger and the trust aim win the With sword dueling it is a different thing, this often resulting in minor wounds, which are regarded as sufficient to satisfy injured honor.

Outside of army circles the custom is looked upon as barbarous. It is not a test or school of courage, for no one questions the courage of English or American officers in whose armies dueling is not tolerated. The victim is often the person who has been grossly wronged, as in the case of young Von Benniggsen, killed in a duel by a man who had been too friendly to Benniggsen's wife. The Kaiser professed to be horrified by the death of Von Benniggsen, and yet in the par-
