MOUNT BRYDGES HAD LIVELY DAY; FALL FAIR A SUCCESS

Entries Reach a Record-Breaking Mark—Increase Was General—Attendance Large.



THE best of weather, the largest attendance ever recorded, and a record-breaking list of entries, made the Caradoc Agricultural Society's fall show at Mt. Brydges yesterday, the best exhibition seen there in many years. Fully five thousand people were in attendance, representing one of the best agricultural districts in Middlesex county, and as many were old acquaintances, the exhibition took on the nature of an enormous reunion. The accommodation in the progressive little village was taxed as it very seldom was before and the scene was one of great activity. At the town hall, which was utilized as a main-building for the occasion, the various exhibits of dairy produce and ladies' work were seen, and in the grounds to the east of the village a number of races were witnessed. The crowd was thus kept interested all day and all must have returned to their homes thoroughly satisfied.

The officers were "kept going" from early in the morning, when the entries commenced to arrive until the last piece of prize money was paid out in the evening. There was plenty of work to do for all, and everything was handled well. The officers were: President, A. Graham; first vice-president,

THE DIFFERENT DEPARTMENTS.

There were close upon 600 entries in all departments. This was a most satisfactory number to the directors, especially when it was announced by the secretary that this was over 100 in excess of last year, and in fact of many previous years of the exhibition. The only cause that can be ascribed to this increase is that the people of the vicinity are making the show more and more popular each year, and that they see the wisdom of using the exhibition as a medium by which to show the class of products that can be raised in the district. Another satisfying feature of the increase was the fact that it was general, every department sharing in it, and showing beyond a doubt the people are becoming more and more interested. In all departments, except one, there was marked improvement.

This exception was cattle. It appears that the people do not take kindly to the idea of bringing this class much to the fore, and can drive to the show with their sheep and hogs, but the cattle have to be led in. This is the explanation of the slump in this department.

Sheep and hogs were well exhibited, and the quality was good. In the former, the judges had far harder work than usual in giving decisions. Keen competition also characterized the entries. There were more entries of better quality than formerly.

The ladies' work exhibit, which was situated in the town hall, attracted many of the visitors. It was the best ever seen at Mount Brydges, and was naturally the center of attraction for the housewives and their daughters.

A very good showing was made in dairy produce, and of butter, cheese and honey were all of first-class quality.

Equally as far ahead of other years were the fruit and vegetable exhibits. In fruits many varieties of fine apples were shown, together with pears and all other classes in season. Numerous kinds of vegetables were well represented.

THE HEAVY EXHIBITS.

There were a large number who exhibited very extensively, among them being R. Sutherland, Caradoc, 25 entries; W. R. Trotter, E. Trotter and W. A. Trotter, about 50 entries each; T. Ackland, Caradoc, 30 entries; W. Doyle, Delaware, 20 entries; W. H. Leask, Delaware, 20 entries; Wm. Curtis & Sons, Caradoc, 30 entries. Others who had large exhibits were C. E. Bateman, W. HORSE CLASS A FEATURE.
The numerous entries and the good quality of the horses made that class a feature of the exhibition. Caradoc has a reputation as a township in which are to be found fine horses, and it was well-sustained at the fair. The many handsome animals made a splendid showing, as they were driven around the ring by their justly proud owners. The stallion, brood mare, gelding, filly and colt classes being amply evidence of the horse-raising interests of the dis-
