POPE SEES END NEAR

His Last Encyclical He Calls His Testament to the Catholic Church.

New York, April 1. — A Rome special to the Sun says: Osservatore Romano, organ of the Vatican, prints a new encyclical by the pope, in which he says the time has come when he must recognize that he is approaching the end of the term of his life on earth and that this encyclical should be his testament to the Catholic Church.

Rome, March 31. — Remarkable testimony is borne by an eminent French-Canadian, who, after the lapse of 14 years, was received in private audience by the pope, as to the marvelous vitality of Pope Leo. He says the pope has, as was to be expected, aged greatly, and "his body has shrunk to an incredible extent, but his memory is perfectly lucid and as keen as ever."

"When I mentioned my name," the pope, reflecting an instant, said, "I remember you perfectly well. You were here 14 years ago, and monsignor has spoken of you in his letters. You were here with your little girls. Are they married?"

"On receiving an affirmative reply and being told that the pope had lost his husband at the beginning of the South African war, the pope exclaimed: 'Ah, that war! It is my great affliction. Then turning to my widowed daughter the pope took her hand between his hands, saying fervently: 'My little one, I bless thee.'"
