PROGRESS SEIZES LONDON TIMES

Capitulates to Modern Journalistic Ideas.

MOBERLY BELL HEADS STAFF

Breaks Century-Old Rule by Offering Inducements to News-vendors to Push Sale of Paper.

London, May 5. — The London Times, that most characteristic of British institutions, is to be remodelled. Since the Daily Mail was started in 1896, its slow-going rivals have unwillingly and for the most part unlearned the lesson that their choice was between revolution or extinction.

When Alfred Harmsworth produced the Daily Mail the London press, though excellent in some respects, was, as far as general news-gathering is concerned, in the last stages of journalistic evolution. If the sneers of superior but purblind pressmen, bred in a prehistoric school, could have killed Mr. Harmsworth's newspaper, it would have been buried within a week of its birth. But painful experience compelled the Daily Telegraph, the Morning Post, the Daily Chronicle and the Daily News to accept the inevitable and to realize that the people wanted news different and varied in character from what the London papers had hitherto vouchsafed them.

The Times had much space in itself beaten by the inflow of new ideas, although its surrender is tentative and hesitating. Its first step is to reduce its price to regular subscribers from six pence to about four pence, while the ordinary purchaser will continue to pay the present high price of six pence.

Its distribution is to be improved by actually offering inducements to the 30,000 news-vendors of London and the country to push its sale, instead of making it a complaint, as heretofore, to supply them at all.

Other astonishing innovations are hinted at. Probably the arrangement under which advertisements are refused after 7 o'clock in the evening, no matter how much space is available, may even be abolished.

TURMOIL IN THE CZAR'S EMPIRE

Disturbances in Cities Cause Many Executions — 600 Hanged at Warsaw.

London, Thursday, May 26. — The Standard publishes a dispatch from the Russian correspondent, in whom the paper, says, it places great confidence, containing most sensational statements regarding the alarming condition of Russia as the outcome of war. The correspondent states that troops have been sent to various cities have been followed by wholesale executions without any civil trial. It is stated that 600 persons have been hanged at Warsaw alone, and that many others have been hanged in Cronstadt and Moscow.

The Standard, in an editorial, says it publishes this correspondent's statements under all reserve, but it thinks there are many indications, such, for instance, as the sinking of the battleship Orel, that the normal disaffection of the population of Russia has been greatly stimulated by the war.

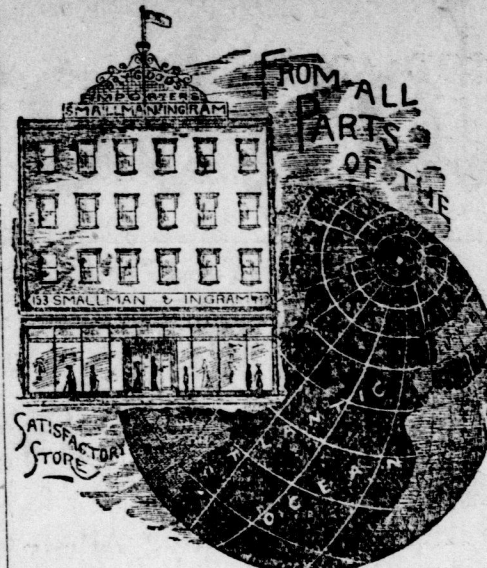

STOWAWAY GOES MAD

Girl From Cape Verde Isle Insane Through Boar of City.

Providence, May 26. — Brief as has been her acquaintance with the strange world of the city, the young woman, who was taken to Boston, before she reached Mansfield in the train bearing the Cape Verde Islanders from here the young woman developed startling evidences of acute mania, and by the time the party reached the Hub she had arrived at a stage of extreme violence, and had to be sent to the Boston House of Detention under police guard.

The Boston immigration officers believed that it was the excitement attendant upon the unexpected sights which she had seen here, and her arrival in this city that brought on the attack of insanity, although it is thought that her detention aboard the schooner here and the hardships of the voyage as viewed from the standpoint of a stowaway, may have been contributory causes.

She seemed to be all right during the voyage over and when she arrived here, indeed, when the party left the Union station here she showed no signs of being mentally unbalanced, but as the train approached Mansfield she became hysterical and two inspectors were obliged to exert their utmost strength to hold her and prevent her from jumping from the train or striking her fellow-passengers. On reaching Boston it was necessary to carry the woman to the barge that was in waiting to take the Providence steamer to the detention station.

SUED FOR \$50,000,000

A New York Widow After Royalties From Standard Oil.

Boston, Mass., May 26.—Elizabeth T. Greenough, of New York, widow of Benjamin T. Greenough, has brought suit against Henry H. Rogers, of the Standard Oil Company, the executor of Charles Pratt, once Mr. Rogers' partner, for \$50,000,000. Mr. Rogers has received a summons in the suit, and the case is to be entered at the June term of the superior court in Boston. It is the biggest suit ever brought in Massachusetts.

One quarter of a cent on every gallon of oil refined by the Standard Oil Company since 1874 is what Mrs. Greenough claims is due her as her husband's executor.

In 1874 Rogers and Pratt, his partner, were humble men in the oil world. They for some time had been working on the purification of oil well products, and particularly the refining of kerosene. Mr. Greenough, it is claimed, suggested a method of rendering the oil products non-explosive, and to refine oil so as to produce a safe lighting fluid. Rogers and Pratt accepted Mr. Greenough's advice, and the inventor bound them to pay him a quarter of a cent on each gallon of oil manufactured.

The profits of Mr. Greenough were large. He had received over \$500,000 on account of royalties when he was lost at sea. A short time ago Mrs. Greenough learned about the old time contract, and has determined to compel the Standard Oil magnates to disgorge.
