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BIG SHIP LOST ON SUPERIOR; ONE OF TWENTY-THREE SAVED

Sole Survivor Washed Ashore From New Freighter Cypress Wrecked Off Deer Park.

Detroit, Oct. 12 .- It is learned that the steamer whigh was lost off Deer Park is the Cypress, and that the mate is the only one of the crew of 22 saved. The Cypress is a new boat, owned by the Lackawanna Transportation Company, of Cleveland.

Detroit, Oct. 12 .- A dispatch to the Journal from Grand Marais reports that an unknown steamer was lost last night in Lake Superior, off Deer Park, 20 miles from Grand Marais. One survivor was washed ashore lashed to a life raft, and is now in a critical condition.

He was just able to tell that he was the sole survivor of 23 persons on

A furious northwest gale prevailed on Lake Superior last night, and the steamer is pounding to pieces, or has been driven on the shore. The condition of the survivor is very critical, but it is hoped that he will rally during the morning, and be able to give more information of the disaster.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Oct. 12 .- The steel steamer Cypress, owned by the Lackawanna Transportation Company, and carrying a cargo of ore, was wrecked last night in Lake Superior off Deer Park, about 30 miles from Grand Marais, and all of the crew of 23, excepting the second mate, were lost. The latter was washed ashore near Deer Park lashed to a life raft and barely alive. He is in a critical wondition and thus far has been able only to tell that the steamer was the Cypress, and that he is the sole survivor. He has suffered terribly from cold and exposure.


