HOCKEY LEAGUE****Toronto May Have Team in the
League With Fast
Easterners.**

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—At the annual meeting of the Eastern Canada Hockey Association, which takes place at Montreal Saturday next, it is likely that the Toronto professionals will apply for admission. A rumor originated from Toronto this week to the effect that the Ontario champions would make an effort to get in the Eastern League, and several of the clubs are said to have been approached by representatives of the Toronto organization.

Amateurs Drop Out.

The withdrawal of the Quebec and Victoria clubs from the Eastern Canada Association leaves but four clubs in the latter, viz., Ottawa, Montreal, Shamrocks and Wanderers. Neither the Quebec nor Victoria club has resigned as yet, but they having entered the Interprovincial Amateur League, will do so, in all probability. The withdrawal of the Quebec and Victoria clubs makes room for a new one. A double schedule will be followed out in the event of the Toronto not entering, but if they do get in a single series of home and home games will be played.

Interviewed yesterday on the subject an officer of the Ottawa hockey club stated that he had heard that Toronto would apply, but had received no news from the Toronto or any other club. However, he was aware that the Toronto, who gave the Wanderers a great game for the Stanley cup last year, would like to get into the Eastern Association.

The following questions are being asked with regard to the new amateur league:

Will the brand of hockey be as good as in the past, and will it hold the interest of the Quebec public as at present, or will it rouse greater interest?

Will an amateur league, composed of teams from Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston and Toronto, thrive financially better than, or as good as a professional league, composed of teams from Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa?

The New Amateurs.

One point left over for discussion from the new Interprovincial Amateur League meeting during the present week was whether the league would embrace four or five clubs. Four clubs are assured, and there is a strong possibility of a fifth being included. The clubs that are definitely in are the Victorias of Montreal, the Toronto A. C., which it is understood will have practically all the players of the St. George's club of Toronto, Quebec club, which has been playing with Victorias in the E. C. H. A., and the Cliffrids, an Ottawa club, to represent the Ottawa A. C., backed by practically the same men as run the Interprovincial football club. Backers of the movement for a return to straight amateur hockey have met with a great deal more success than anyone conversant with what has gone on in the game in Eastern Canada the last five, or six years would have credited as impossible a short time ago.

Victorias of Montreal have most of last year's players, including such famous puck-chasers as Russell Bowie, Blair Russell, Billy Gilmour and Cavie Howard.

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Latest Gridiron Jottings and Bowling Notes**IS IT THIRD BIG
BASEBALL LEAGUE****Eastern and American Association Withdraw From the
Chicago Conference.**

Chicago, Nov. 12.—The warring factions of organized baseball retreated today with victory perched on neither banner. "Pat" Powers, president of the Eastern League, and Joe O'Brien, president of the American Association, who booted the meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs, departed on early trains.

The so-called regulars of other and more numerous leagues belonging to the national organization had a brief session and adjourned without date to hold their next meeting at Memphis, Tenn., probably early in the new year.

Looks Like War.

Garry Hermann, president of the national commission, was unable to respond to a telegram of the other members to come to Chicago and Mr. Pullman accordingly took a train for Cincinnati tonight.

A survey of the despatch field showed that while disputed issues may still be adjusted, the method by which this may be brought about is obscure. Both sides have taken what they term an unalterable stand, and unless one of them weakens students of baseball politics declare there is a likelihood of another major, or near-major combination, consisting of the bolting leagues.

It is said the national commission will go almost any length to avoid this, as the bolting leagues consist of the only practical market for players from the National and American Leagues.

That the American Association and Eastern League are in deadly earnest is said to be indicated by the disposal of George Tebeau, of the Denver Club. Tebeau also owns the Kansas City and the Louisville clubs of the American Association, and the sale of Denver property is said to have been to avoid the embarrassment of owning a team in the Western League while running two teams in an outlaw organization. In the event of a secession, it is regarded as practically certain that the outlaws would put teams in major league territory, probably Cincinnati, St. Louis, Pittsburgh and Chicago. A ray of hope was discovered in the statement made by President Powers to the meeting of the National Association that he favored organized baseball. But his leaning in that direction, like that of President O'Brien, is not sufficiently strong to keep him in the organization unless his demands are met—namely, control of the board of arbitration and the privilege of drafting from the Southern and Western Leagues.

Adjournment came following the two hours of sporadic conference, the net result of which was to develop an appreciable degree of conciliation without technically approaching a settlement. President Powers, of the Eastern League, in addressing the so-called "regulars," declared himself in favor of organized baseball, but representatives of his association did not attend the meeting. President O'Brien of the American Association remained aloof. Both leagues, it was stated, will anticipate the New York meeting arranged for Dec. 5 by a preliminary meeting at Buffalo next Wednesday.

Both sides at adjournment suggested to appoint a committee to conduct further negotiations, but each side wanted the other to make the first move in this direction. The "regulars" pointed out that the differences might still be carried before the national board of arbitration, but it was deemed unlikely that the bolters would take kindly to this idea, as their demand for control of this board was the rack of which the association split when the "bolters" demanded that they be given control of it.

The committee appointed yesterday by the regulars to confer with the national commission was perpetuated, while Harry Pullman, of the commission, said that members of the commission were willing to talk informally with representatives of the secessionists in their individual capacities, but not officially. The national board of arbitration decided to compel clubs in the Ohio and Pennsylvania leagues to pay players the full salary to the close of the season, Sept. 30, under penalty of the player being released from his contract with his club. The ruling affects about 100 players whose contracts read until Sept. 30 who cease playing Sept. 7. The clubs were given until Dec. 1 to settle accounts with players and report to the chairman of the national board of arbitration.
