BOGUS CHINA CASE.

FINE SHOWING MADE FOREST CITY HORSES

With Toronto Have the Best Jumpers in the Big Show at Montreal.

Montreal, May 13.—At the horse show Toronto and London owners again proved that they have the best jumpers in the show, and added to their previous laurels by capturing all the ribbons in class 67 for the best performance over three jumps in increasing height. Crow & Murray's "The Wasp" was the first; Douglas Young's "The Minister," second; the London horse Sir Edward, owned by Leonard Wood, third, and "Aemilius Jarvis" Hercules, fourth.

In pairs shown to four-wheelers, Miss Wilks, of Galt, was placed third to the pairs shown by Reginald Vanderbilt and Herbert C. Cox.

Mrs. Cox's Jasmine was adjudged best of the saddle horses over 15.2.

Reginald Vanderbilt's Phoebe Walton won class 38 for high steppers, two local horses coming next, and Crow & Murray's Honor Bright fourth.

In the afternoon Honor Bright split the "two Vanderbilt entries. Lord Brooke and Lord Burleigh, in the class for horses not exceeding 15.3 shown to a two-wheeler, the Toronto entry being awarded the red ribbon.

In the final event of the evening, hunters ridden by members in pink, the westerners again came near to making a clean sweep of the card.

Wood Leonard, the London owner, won with his Sir Edward. Hon. Chifwood Sifton captured second with his Glenwood, ridden by his 15-year-old son, while Mr. Leonard got third with his Philosopher, and Douglas Young's The Minister, fourth.

CITY AND COUNTY ARE AGAIN AT LOGGERHEADS

County Representative Maintains That \$40 a Year Too Much Is Paid for Hospital Patients.

At the regular meeting of the hospital trust there was a dispute between the city members of the board and the representatives of the county as to the division of the trust funds donated to the hospital. After considerable argument it was decided to hold a conference between the city and county auditors and the trust to see if the matter could be adjusted.

Mr. Turnbull's contention was that the county was paying the city about \$40 a year too much. When the interest of the trust fund was divided each year, the paying patients and their cost of maintenance was taken out of the general expenses, and the money divided according to the number of poor patients from the city and county who were getting its share of the matter.

Mr. Turnbull took it from the agreement that the division should be made on the actual number of patients in the hospital, both paying and free patients. By so doing, the county's share would be increased \$40. He refused to sign the voucher for the payment of the money until this sum was deducted.

The Agreement.

Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., read the original trust agreement, in which it was pointed out that the division should be made proportionately according to the number of city and county patients. At that time there were no paying patients. He interpreted the clause to mean that the money should be divided proportionately according to the number of patients sent by the city and the number sent by the county. There was no other interpretation than that "city and county patients" in the agreement meant patients sent in by the city and county, poor patients in other words.

Have Judge Decide It.

Mr. Turnbull would not accept this explanation.

Chairman Screaton was in favor of going to the county judge, and getting his interpretation, as that would settle the matter.

However, it was decided to have a conference between City Auditor Jewell, County Auditor Stanley, and the trust, in order to see if some arrangement could not be made, satisfactory to both parties.

Superintendent Heard reported that there were three patients in the hospital from the county, but the township reeves refused to give a certificate for them, and would not pay the bills. Mr. Heard stated that they were in a serious condition when brought in and they could not be refused.

"Unless the county representatives are fairer in this matter, we will have to refuse to take any patient in unless accompanied by an order," said Chairman Screaton. "It is rather hard to do this, but we must protect ourselves."

Mr. Turnbull promised to investigate.

Nurses' Graduation.

Chairman Screaton reported that all arrangements for the nurses' graduation had been completed. The function would be held in the new building on Wednesday next.

It was decided to have the yard inspectors of the city distribute a number of the pamphlets on "How to Prevent Tuberculosis."

Green & Co. were awarded the coal contract.

Superintendent Heard reported that 148 patients were admitted during the month, 41 males, 78 females and 29 children, and during the same time
