IS BELLE ELMORE**REALLY DEAD?**

Or, Is Crippen the King of All

Press Agents?

ODD YARN FROM U. S.

The Doctor and Miss Leneve Waive

Chance to Fight Extradition.

Quebec, Aug. 8.—That Dr. Crippen

and Miss Leneve are willing to go

back to England and stand trial there

was confirmed this morning when,

while they could have taken measures

to obtain a warrant of habeas corpus,

they did not make the least move to-

wards obtaining it. They quietly spent

their time reading in their apart-

ment in the documents prepared at

the local court of sessions called for

the appearing of Crippen and Miss

Leneve, before that court today, as

the commitment under which they are

held in jail calls for the decision there

until they are deported to Eng-

land, that is, when Inspector Mitchell

arrives with the papers he has been

given by the British police.

Crippen and his companion have al-

ready manifested their intention of re-

turning to London without fighting

and they have not changed their

minds.

A Big Crowd Gathered.

A vast crowd, amongst which were

a number of newspaper correspondents

and photographers, had assembled this

morning in the court house, but they

were disappointed. No more will Crip-

pen or Miss Leneve be brought there.

They will live a quiet life in jail until

the day when they are taken aboard a

ship leaving for the other side, and

that apparently will be soon.

The Royal Edward of the Canadian

Northern fleet, which is carrying In-

spector Mitchell and two matrons of the

British police, was reported at Quebec

this morning three hundred miles east

of Belle Isle, being then one thousand

and thirty miles below Quebec, which

she is expected to reach early Wednes-

day forenoon.

Sunday in Jail.

Sunday was peacefully observed at

the Quebec jail, and while Miss Leneve

refused to attend any religious ser-

vice, Dr. Crippen attended mass in the

jail chapel, kneeling between the two

guardians, who never took their eyes

off him. He occupied the last pew in

the little chapel, and throughout the

divine service his lips slowly whis-

pered prayers. Very few, if any, of the

other prisoners noticed his presence.

He was the last to enter and the first

to leave, and stood in a respectful at-

titude all the time. After the service

he retired to his cell a rather sober

man.
