

WITH BLARE OF TRUMPETS AND THE BOOMING OF GUNS GEORGE V. PROCLAIMED KING

Brilliant and Impressive Ceremony This Morning at Various Places in Old London Witnessed by Many Thousand Who Acclaim New Monarch With Mighty Cheers—Edward's Burial to Take Place On the 20th at Windsor.

[Associated Press Cable.] London, May 9.—The proclamation announcing the accession of King George V. was read at St. James' Palace this morning. Friday, May 20, has been definitely fixed as the date for King Edward's funeral.

In the meantime it has been arranged to have a private lying-in-state at Buckingham Palace, and a public one in Westminster Hall in the Parliament Buildings.

With the time-honored company of a most brilliant character, George V. this morning was publicly proclaimed King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and the British Dominions Beyond the Seas, Monarch of the Faith, and the Emperor of India.

Sharply at the stroke of 9, four heralds arrayed in medieval uniforms of scarlet, heavily braided with gold, mounted the balcony of Friars Court at St. James' Palace, where Queen Victoria presented herself to the people upon the opening of her memorable reign, and blew a fanfare through the long silver trumpets.

The precincts of the palace were crowded with a great mass of people, many of whom could secure, but the briefest glimpse of the proceedings. The balconies and roofs of the ancient palace, which had been draped with red cloth, were reserved for the nobles, all of whom were in the deepest mourning. Members of the royal household, the ministers and their wives and high officers of state all in brilliant uniforms, were gathered around the court. General Sir John D. P. French, with the headquarters staff in full dress uniform, stood surrounded by a troop of horse guards in their red tunics and breastplates polished steel.

MINISTERIAL ALLIANCE MAKES OBJECTION TO CITY COUNCIL

Protest Against Arrangements Made to Hold a Civic Service in St. Paul's Cathedral in Memory of the Late King—Matter Will Be Taken Up With Rev. Canon Dann.

A deputation from the Ministerial Alliance of the city waited on the council at noon today, and asked that a civic service be held in the armories if possible, in any event in some place where all the clergy and laity of the city could unite in expressing their sorrow at the death of King Edward.

Objection was made that the council had already arranged for a civic service in St. Paul's Cathedral, and it would be impossible to hold two services.

Mayor Beattie and Ald. Ashplant were named a committee to interview Rev. Canon Dann, and discover if the service in St. Paul's was a memorial service or a civic service. If the former, a non-denominational service will be arranged for.

Rev. A. J. Bowen, president of the Ministerial Association, introduced the deputation.

C. P. R. APPROACH THE CITY TO RUN OVER L. AND P. S. R.

City Fathers Refuse to Make Any Statement On the Matter—Will Come in as Stated Over Trafalgar Street—McClary Company Have a Say in Matter.

Advances have been made to the city for the use of the London and Port Stanley tracks from Trafalgar street to the Michigan Central station, by the Canadian Pacific.

A prominent railwayman informed The Advertiser that such was the case, to his personal knowledge. None of the city fathers would discuss the matter.

Mayor Beattie absolutely refused to make any statement on the question. The London and Port Stanley, or rather the McClary Company, have a switch running along Trafalgar street, east of Adelaide street. If the company goes to that far, they would have to have the approval of the city and McClarys to come all the way down town.

Discrimination Alleged.

It is claimed that the Grand Trunk Railway discriminates against the C. P. R. in the interswitching line. Only one switching is made a day, and often cars are held up for 24 hours or more, it is claimed. That does not make for good freight service, and is said to be at the bottom of all this trouble about getting into the city from the southeast section.

"It would be an easy matter for the C. P. R. to come down town," said Ald. Tancouk. "I think it would make for better service. It looks like a fine thing for the city."

"I should make the city boom if the C. P. R. do as I understand they intend to do," said Ald. Underwood.

"It will be a fine thing for the city," said Ald. Ashplant. "I see no objection whatever to the company coming down town."

Out For Business.

"The C. P. R. are out for business, and if they once commence an undertaking, it will be a thing we have to take into account," said Ald. Saunders. "I am not clear as to how they will get into the city, as I have not looked over the ground, but if they have as much faith in London as that, we should have more, and make London boom."

"It is a great thing," said Ald. Morgan. "I hope we do not have too many crossings, as that would be dangerous, but the more roads we have leading into the city, the better for all of us."

KAISER WILHELM TO ATTEND FUNERAL

Berlin, May 9.—It was officially announced today that Emperor William will attend the funeral of King Edward, residing in London at Buckingham Palace, upon the invitation of King George.

EXCHANGE OF PULPITS

Took Place in the Methodist Churches on Sunday.

In order to specially present the aims and work proposed to be done by the London Methodist Council, a general exchange of ministers took place in the Methodist pulpits of the city on Sunday.

It is the desire of the council to raise \$2,000 for the furtherance of this work, and to urge the work the exchange took place.

HULL MOB TRIES TO RUSH HOSPITAL

The Police Called Out to Control Friends of Explosion Victims.

A RELIEF SUBSCRIPTION

City Council Will Make Grant For Relief of Those Who Have Lost Bread Winners.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 9.—Scenes at the Ottawa General Hospital on Water street shortly after the wounded from the Hull explosion began to arrive last evening, were pathetic. The hospital was besieged by a small army of anxious people inquiring for missing members of their families. The hospital officials did all they could to satisfy inquiries, but as the crowd increased they were unable to give attention to all. Many people whose friends or relatives had not been home to supper, frantically besought the authorities for news. Soon the crowd increased to great proportions, at one time threatening to break down the doors of the hospital. The police had to be called. Chief Ross dispatched five men under Sgt. Berrigan to the hospital, and the arrival of the police did much to keep people in order, although many hung around for hours in their quest for information.

John Blanchard is still alive in the Ottawa General Hospital, but will likely die. The young son of Ald. Labelle, who fell from the broken window of his home and was reported to have been killed by the fall, is expected to recover.

It is stated on good authority that until a few days ago nearly 60 tons of dynamite had been stored just a short distance away from the scene of the explosion. Had it not been shipped out last week to railway contractors, it is practically certain it would also have exploded yesterday, and the results would have been appalling.

The city fathers are now planning to erect in Hull four years ago. Two years ago the Hull city council brought action in the courts to oust the concern from the city on the ground that it was a menace to life and property. The court ruled, however, that there was no danger. This, perhaps, relieved Hull of all legal damages connected with the catastrophe. There will be a public funeral for the burial of the victims' bodies.

The city council of Hull will make a grant toward the relief of those who are left in want as a result of the death or serious injury of their breadwinners. A public subscription list will be opened for the same purpose.

DETROIT BALL TEAM MAY PLAY IN LONDON

Jennings Would Like to Come to the Forest City for a Day.

Mr. F. C. Buzzell, the American agent in this city, and Mr. Frank Reid were in Detroit Saturday, and Mr. Buzzell had an interview with President Frank Navin, of the Detroit American League Club, and Hughie Jennings, the Tigers' manager, regarding the proposed game in this city.

It is said that the club officials looked on the proposition favorably, and if an open date can be secured, the team will be brought to London this summer.

Jennings favors the trip to this city as he promised the fans at the Mooney Gibson reception last fall that he would bring the team along if possible. Several times since then he has in letters to friends been repeating the promise to bring the champions along, if the consent of the management can be secured.

The Tigers have been compelled to postpone a number of games so far this spring, and if these can be taken off of without interfering with one of the open dates, London will witness a major league game this summer.

The offer of Mr. Buzzell, who holds the option of Tecumseh Park, to give the proceeds of the game to the London Health Association for the consumption sanatorium, appeals to the Detroit club, it is said, and this may help to bring the team along.

NO EPIDEMIC OF SCARLET FEVER

Medical Health Officer Desires to Reassure the Public.

Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, medical health officer, writes The Advertiser as follows:

"As I have lately received a large number of telephone messages from citizens on the subject of scarlet fever, I fear there is a belief that the disease is epidemic in the city, and in order to remove that impression, wish to give the following facts: The total number of cases of scarlet fever which have occurred in this city since Jan. 1 has been 89, of which only six proved fatal. In regard to the Talbot Street School, there have been only seven cases this year.

"I wish emphatically to state that there is no scarlet fever epidemic in the city, and that the number of cases reported is less, rather than more, than the average.

"There is no reason whatever why any school should be closed."

C. P. R. IMPROVEMENTS MEAN A GREAT BOOM FOR EAST END

Company's Plans Are Almost Matured—Large Parcels of Land Bought With an Eye to the Future—Mayor Says He Will Have Something Important to Say in the Near Future.

The announcement that the Canadian Pacific had made large purchases of land in the east end of the city for a depot, roundhouse and shops, has caused much comment throughout the city.

Large numbers of citizens walked out to the proposed site of the car shops and station on Sunday, and discussed its possibilities as a site for the work.

Some minor details of the deal are yet to be completed, but it is expected that there will be little or no trouble about them. The company are after some smaller blocks of land to round out their purchases, and these options will be finished today.

Big Purchases.

The company bought many lots, including those along Elgin street, Quebec street, Ontario street, and others near Adelaide. Some land was also purchased along the right of way from Adelaide street east.

Mr. Wm. Hayman disposed of some blocks of land, and the company also purchased the Higgins property just outside the city, about 75 acres in all. It will be used for truckage purposes and sidings, with the possibility that some factories may be located near at hand.

The New East End Station.

The East End station will be located at the southwest corner of the C. P. R. tracks and Quebec street. All the plans are not given out, but it is understood that it will be a commodious structure, built not with an eye to present necessities, but for future development.

The shops will be built west of the station. Considerable blocks of land have been purchased there, and plenty of room will be available for the big works.

Office buildings will be built in the station, in order that there will be sufficient room for the clerical work to be done at this office.

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HODGETTS TO HEAD WAR ON TUBERCULOSIS

Will Have Charge of the Health Branch of the Conservation Association.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, May 9.—It is understood that official announcement will be made shortly by the chairman of the Conservation Association, Hon. Clifford Sifton, of the appointment of Dr. Charles Hodgetts, secretary of the Ontario Provincial Board of Health, to take charge of the health branch of the commission's work. A far-reaching campaign of education and of practical endeavor in respect to the prevention of the spread of tuberculosis will be conducted. The pollution of streams by sewage, municipal sanitation, etc., is contemplated by the commission, with co-operation of the Federal and Provincial Governments. Dr. Hodgetts, who is regarded as the very best man available to take charge of the work, has been asked to accept the position, and it is understood he has accepted.

UNKNOWN MAN IN DETROIT RIVER

Body of Unidentified Young Man Found Near Island View Hotel.

Walkerville, May 9.—The body of an unidentified man was found in the Detroit River, near the Island View Hotel, last evening. The man was about 23 years of age, 5 feet 8 inches tall, bright red hair and a clean-shaven face, and weighed about 135 pounds. Evidently it had been in the water about 10 days. There was nothing by which to identify the corpse.

PETER TAFF ILL

Suffers From an Attack of Blood-Poisoning.

Peter Taff, one of the city street-cleaners, and a well-known figure on the streets of the city, has been laid up for the past week with blood-poisoning in his right hand. He injured his hand on his wagon while cleaning the streets some time ago, and it was feared for a time that it might be necessary to amputate his hand, but he is now progressing favorably and no such serious results are anticipated. Dr. W. J. Stevenson is attending the injury.

DRUNK AND DISORDERLY

George McDonald Arraigned on This Charge in Court.

George McDonald, of Ridout street south, appeared before Magistrate Love this morning, charged with being drunk and disorderly. He was bailed to appear again in a week, as the man with whom he was fighting got away. McDonald told the court he did not remember who the man was.

A former Indian-hater told the court that if he were allowed to go he would never touch another drop.

"Nobody will be able to make me take it again," he declared.

"All right," said the magistrate. "It's up to you to make good."

MISS FRANK SWORE PRODGER WAS THE MAN WHO SHOT HER IDENTIFICATION WAS POSITIVE

Victim of the Shooting Tragedy On the Wellington Road Appeared in Court and Gave Her Evidence Against Prisoner—Prodger Looks Well—Was Again Remanded.

John Prodger's preliminary examination was concluded at the police court this morning, and he was positively identified by Miss Elizabeth Frank as the man who on April 5 last broke into her house and shot her.

Prodger was remanded until Thursday morning in order that all the evidence may be produced before the court.

Miss Frank was the star witness for the prosecution. She gave her evidence in a clear, straightforward way, and remained unshaken throughout. She came to the police station in a cab, and was accompanied by her sister, Mrs. Rudd.

Miss Frank looked well and was attired in a neat black dress. She was escorted to the clerk's office by Detectives Down and Eglerton and remained there until called.

Prisoner Looks Well.

Prodger arrived about five minutes before court opened, and was looking better than he has for some time. He was represented by Mr. P. H. Bartlett. Dr. Geo. H. Wilson, who was first called, gave evidence regarding being called to attend Miss Frank.

"Were the wounds in the neck and ear caused by the same or separate bullets?" asked Mr. McKillop.

"By separate bullets, I think."

"How did the bullets travel?"

"In a horizontal position. There was a good deal of powder about both

wounds indicating that the firing had taken place at very close range."

Dr. Wilson stated that considerable skin was off Miss Frank's nose, but he could not say how that had been done.

Not Fully Recovered.

"Has she recovered?" asked the crown attorney.

"Not yet."

"What calibre revolver would you say was used?"

"About 38."

Cross-examined by Mr. P. H. Bartlett, witness said from his previous experience he would say the bullets were from a 38-calibre revolver.

The bullet, he said, had entered on the right side of the neck and had passed out under the left ear, about three-quarters of an inch higher than where it entered. There was another wound on the left side about two inches from the other.

"Was there any powder about the wounds on the nose?"

"There were marks of a dark color, but I could not say whether or not they were from powder."

"Is Miss Frank out of danger now?"

"Yes."

"Were the wounds dangerous at first?" asked Magistrate Love.

"Yes, there was particular danger from hemorrhage and from blood-poisoning from the wounds in the neck."

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CIGARMAKERS MAY STRIKE ON FRIDAY NEXT IT'S SAID

It Is Alleged That Word Has Been Received From the Headquarters of the International Union—Over 200 Men in the Union in This City.

The cigarmakers will go on strike on Friday next, it is said.

It is expected that an announcement would be made last week, as to the probable date of the walk-out, but a delay was caused for some reason or other, and it was decided to wait until this week.

It is stated that word has been received from the international union giving the sanction of that body to the strike, and that it will be followed by a walk-out on Friday of this week.

A member of the union, when questioned about the rumor, declared that his information was correct.

There are over 200 cigarmakers in the union here, and several shops will be seriously affected.

The manufacturers have been watching the situation very carefully and have been making preparations for a strike.

Some are having their work done outside the city, and others are making arrangements to bring cigarmakers into London from outside sources.

There are a number of open shops in London also, but they will not be affected to any great extent.

RUMOR SAYS ANEXANDRA WAS SERIOUSLY ILL

Said to Have Burst Blood Vessel During a Paroxysm of Grief.

London, May 9.—It was officially announced at Buckingham Palace at noon that the queen mother, Alexandra, was well, and bearing up bravely. This morning rumors were current that in a paroxysm of grief the mother of the King had broken a blood vessel, and that her condition was serious.

AGED MAN INJURED

Accident to Mr. C. D. Gowman, on Ottawaw Avenue.

Mr. C. D. Gowman, residing on Brick street, was delivering some eggs on Ottawaw avenue, and coming out of the house fell in some manner, spraining both wrists and causing a nasty bruise on his forehead. Mr. Gowman is quite an elderly man, and the effects of the fall may be quite serious. He is unable to explain the accident, but he is affected with heart trouble. His injuries at the hospital were attended to by Dr. Wilson and he was later removed to his home on Brick street.
