WHITE NOTES READ AT BRIBERY TRIAL

Counsel for Minority Leader in Illinois Legislature Introduce Letters.

Chicago, Ill., June 16.—Expulsion of two spectators and the destruction of letters written by Representative Charles A. White to Representative Lee O'Neill Browne, were features today at the trial of Browne, minority leader in the Illinois Legislature, on a charge of bribing White with \$1,000 to vote for William Lorimer for United States Senator. When called upon to identify his letters, on cross-examination, White was vague in many of his replies.

The men removed from Judge McCrory's court were Ernest Krulwich, a Chicago politician, and Henry Wagner. The latter owes his embarrassment to having made audible expression of a belief in the guilt of the defendant. State's Attorney Wayman said he had not seen Krulwich do anything wrong, but that during the trial of "Skippy" Madden, a labor leader, charged with extortion, Krulwich had shaken hands with Madden in front of the court.

Krulwich, whose indictment two years ago charging him with frauds at primary elections was dismissed when the primary law was found to be unconstitutional, was served with a subpoena to appear before a grand jury tomorrow. He declared that he could neither fathom Mr. Wayman's reasons for the summons nor for his expulsion from the court room.

The defence, on cross examination, began an attack on the character of White, and sought to introduce certain of White's letters. The court ruled that before they could be accepted as evidence White must first identify the letters. White's evasive replies visibly nettled Browne's attorneys. Eventually two letters were identified. In one of them, written after the election of Senator Lorimer, White said:

"I have only 90 cents in the world. If you will fill in the inclosed promissory note for whatever money you will loan me I will be glad."

The note, made out for \$50, also was placed in evidence. Other notes aggregating \$100 were also introduced. One expression in the White-Browne letters was:

"The future is sure to bring surprises. Do not be surprised at anything I may do in the future."

A letter written by White to Senator Lorimer was likewise read to the jury. White's letter was about to place his experiences as a legislator before the public. He said he had been offered \$25 a word for it.

"Did you offer it to the Chicago Tribune?" was asked.

"Yes, sir," replied White, producing his contract, by which the Tribune agreed to pay him \$3,250 for his story of the alleged bribery. Part of the sum, White said, had already been paid him.

The cross-examination, it is expected, will continue all day tomorrow.

SUPREME COURT JUDGMENTS. Ottawa, June 15.—In the supreme court today judgments were delivered in cases heard during the spring term as follows:

Ontario Bank vs. McAllister, appeal dismissed with costs; Duff and Anglin, J. J., dissenting.

Grand Trunk Railway Company vs. city of Fort William, appeal dismissed with costs; Davies and Duff, J. J., dissenting.

Smith vs. Sugarman, appeal allowed. Judgment of trial judge restored, appellant to have costs in this court and in court below.

McDonald vs. Grand Trunk Railway Company, appeal allowed with costs. Judgment to be entered for \$1,800 under the workmen's compensation for injuries' act, with costs here and in court below, as well as of trial, Anglin, J. J., dissenting.

Fralick vs. Grand Trunk Railway Company, appeal dismissed. Davies, J. J., dissenting.

McLeod vs. Sawyer-Massey Company, appeal dismissed with costs. Duff and Anglin dissenting.

Advices received by the general passenger department of the Grand Trunk System by wire from Victoria, dated last Saturday, announce that prospects for the first sailing of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company's new steamer "Prince Rupert" leaving Victoria June 13, and Vancouver same date, are most encouraging. This new service will be inaugurated with a full complement of passengers for Prince Rupert and Stewart at the head of the Portland Canal, about one-half of the number of passengers being bound for the latter place. The reception given this steamer on her arrival at Victoria and beyond expectations. Huge crowds all express most satisfaction. The first visitor who boarded the new steamship at Victoria was the wife of Lieutenant-Governor Patterson. Premier McBride, the cabinet ministers and the most prominent citizens also visited the ship. All unite in placing the new boat as the foremost in the pacific coast service.

Charged With Attempted Poisoning

Brookville, June 16.—Charles Landon, a tinsmith, in the employ of Sheridan & Power for 12 years, is in jail on remand charged with attempting to poison J. H. Sheridan, the senior member of the firm. The case is a peculiar one, as Landon Sheridan was on the best of terms, and no reason is assigned for the alleged attack. Sheridan has been in the habit of bringing his dinner to the shop. He detected a peculiar taste in the tea on three different occasions, and each time investigated the source of the milk supply, which was found all right. His suspicions then became aroused, and, filling his tea can with water, the same peculiar acid taste was noticed.

Finally a trap was laid. A constable was placed in hiding in the shop, and Landon, being alone, was noticed to remove the cover from Sheridan's lunch basket, open the can and drop in a powder or some other substance. His arrest followed, and with it came a straight denial of the charge.

Samples of the water and tea, in all eight, preserved by Sheridan, have been forwarded to the provincial analyst, and the result of further action will depend on the finding. Landon is highly respected in the county.

DEATH OF MRS. RIDDLE APPARENTLY ACCIDENT

May Have Taken Poison in Mistake for Medicinal Tablets.

Norwich, Ont., June 15.—The inquest on the death of Mrs. Ray Riddle, wife of Dr. Riddle, the well-known veterinarian, opened today, and after examination of a number of witnesses, was adjourned until next Thursday. Mrs. Riddle was found dead on the floor on the evening of June 7. Possibly she took the poison in mistake for some medicine.

Dr. Riddle told the jury that he kept prussic acid in the course of his ordinary work.

Concerning a policy of \$2,000, which was recently taken out on the life of Mrs. Riddle, the doctor testified that he did not need any more insurance himself, and that he did not see his wife, and that she put the insurance on her life of her own free will.

This evidence was corroborated by Insurance Agent Irwin.

The other witnesses told of the happy relations existing between Dr. and Mrs. Riddle. They also testified that Mrs. Riddle was in good spirits 30 minutes before her death.

The dead woman's stomach is still in the hands of the provincial analyst at Toronto.

IS 100 YEARS OLD

Mrs. Janet McCorkendall, Strathroy, Passes Century Mark.

Strathroy's oldest resident, Mrs. Janet McCorkendall celebrated her one hundred birthday yesterday. In the afternoon a number of friends presented Mrs. McCorkendall with a purse containing about \$35 in money. Mrs. Kennings kindly took charge of the presentation. Mrs. McCorkendall, although one hundred years old, enjoys good health. She is a native of Scotland, and loves to hear the bagpipes, and to converse in the language of the Highlanders. Jessie McLaughlin, the Scotch vocalist, always visits Mrs. McCorkendall, when professional engagements call her to Strathroy, and sings for her some of the old Scottish songs.

Mrs. McCorkendall, who is living with her daughter, Mrs. Nilvins, on Metcalfe street, was born on the island of Benbecula, Invernesshire, Scotland, in 1810, and has lived under the reign of six sovereigns. She came to Canada with her husband and family in the year 1852, settling on a farm in the township of Williams, County of Middlesex. She was left a widow in the year 1863, and moved to Strathroy in 1867. Of her family three are living: Mrs. Nilvins, Strathroy; Lachlan, Toronto; and Mrs. McKie, London.

THE GROCERS' TRIP

Wednesday's Excursion to Detroit Proved Highly Successful.

The Retail Grocers' Association should be very proud of the manner in which their annual excursion to Detroit, via the Grand Trunk Railway, passed off yesterday. The fifteen excursionists were laden with a happy lot of groceries and their friends. Engine No. 309, one of the new engines just out of the shop the day before, led the train, with Engineer Harry McHarg at the throttle. The train was in charge of Conductor Joseph O'Brien. The run to Windsor was made in 3 hours and 3 minutes. On the way to Detroit the committee looked after the welfare of their guests in a very careful manner, giving them delicacies to enjoy during the ride.

On arriving at Detroit, the excursionists separated to the various places of amusement. The ball game in the afternoon was witnessed by many Londoners, who saw the Boston team under the management of Patsy Donovan of 1888-89 Tecumseh fame, win from Detroit by a score of 8 to 3.

The train left the Windsor depot at 9:20 p.m. and a more rapid run was made to London, the time being 2 hours and 35 minutes. A section of the road, from Glencoe to Komoka, of 33 miles, was dashed off in 35 minutes.

To the committee in charge, Mr. C. W. Summers, president; Thos. Shaw, treasurer; and Cyril Hayes, secretary, with the assistance of the several members of the Grocers' Association, much praise is due. Every comfort was looked after, and the excursion should be highly elated at the success of this excursion, which was one of the most prosperous in their history. The train provided by the Grand Trunk officials included the first cars of the passenger equipment. Mr. Ernie Ruse, of the depot ticket office, accompanied the excursionists.

BORDEN AT TORONTO

Declares Should Be Pronouncement From Country As To Navy.

Toronto, June 16.—The proposal that the people of Canada should have opportunity of directly pronouncing upon the country's permanent naval policy was emphasized by Mr. R. L. Borden in his address at the Conservative demonstration at Long Branch yesterday. The leader devoted the major portion of his address to a discussion of the problem. He reiterated his advocacy of an immediate contribution to meet immediate imperial needs, and counselled further consideration in involving the basis of permanent co-operation with the mother country, having in mind the maintenance of the unity and integrity of the empire, while preserving the full autonomy of its various dominions.

EARTHQUAKE IN SPAIN.

Madrid, June 16.—Earthquake shocks varying in time from four to ten seconds, were felt here this morning, and in Cordova, Valencia and Alusia. No casualties are reported, but in Almeria some houses were damaged.

A COMMON CAUSE

Edinburgh, June 16.—A letter from Theodore Roosevelt was read at today's session of the World's Missionary Conference. The American roused much enthusiasm.

The letter said: "It is a matter of real and profound regret to me that I am imperatively called away to America, so that I am unable to be present at the World's Missionary Conference."

"Nothing like your proposed conference has ever hitherto taken place. From many nations, and from many churches, your delegates gather on this great occasion, to initiate a movement which I believe will be fraught with far-reaching good. For the first time in four centuries Christians of every name come together without renouncing their several convictions, or sacrificing their several principles to confer as to what common action may be taken in order to make their common Christianity not only known to, but a vital force among the two-thirds of the human race to whom, as yet, it is hardly even a name."

MACKINSON WINS APPEAL

The supreme court yesterday gave judgment in the appeal of Mackinson, against the G. T. R. At the last session of the court, Chief Justice Meredith awarded Alex. Mackinson \$2,500 for the loss of a hand at the Wellington street crossing.

The company appealed against the verdict, but the supreme court sustaining the trial judge, Mr. J. M. McEvoy, represented Mackinson.

WORK TRAIN BACKED INTO PASSENGER

Frankford, June 15.—Today while the morning train for Harrisburg was standing on the track at the station, ready to go out, the gravel train backed into the rear car of the Harrisburg train, badly smashing it. A brakeman and fireman and some of the passengers were badly bruised, but it is thought not seriously. The names of the injured are not available.

SAYS HE GOT IT

Father of the "Yellow Kid" Claims to Have Received Fortune.

Hamilton, Ont., June 16.—David Burn, formerly David Kidd, of Toronto, and well known in this city, in a letter to a friend in Toronto, claims that he has obtained possession of \$1,425,000, the sum of money he went to Australia to collect. Kidd, while on a visit to Chicago some years ago, befriended a young girl he found in a house of questionable repute, and claimed that he reformed her and took her home to her father, a Pittsburgh millionaire. She died shortly afterwards, and her father went to Australia with his wife. He was very grateful to Kidd, and when he died left him a million and a half dollars of his fortune. A third of the amount was to be paid to him for fallen girls in Toronto, and the rest was to be for his own use. One condition was that Kidd should change his name to Burn, the name of the millionaire, and that he did last fall in Toronto before sailing for Australia.

Kidd or Burn was very friendly with William Hunter, treasurer of the Children's Aid Society, and he promised to offer to the society when he got the money. He hinted that he would build the much-needed children's shelter. Mr. Hunter says although the newspapers failed to get a story of whatever of the millionaire Burn or his daughter and branded Burn as a fakir, he had proofs that led Mr. Hunter to believe in him all through the long controversy which was taken up by papers all over the country.

Even at the present time there are many who are "from Missouri," and they want to see Kidd in the flesh with his fortune before they will believe his story. At present the only
