Many Thousands of Widows Under Twenty Years-Strange Customs, There are more than 17,000 widows in

India aged five and under. Such is one of the striking facts recorded in a blue book published recently containing a general report on the census of India in 1911. Of some 800,000 widows of under twenty, more than 94,000 are aged between five and

The population is returned as 315,-156.396-more than the whole population of Europe without Russia. In the last thirty-nine years there has been an increase in the population of some fifty millions.

Several curious marriage customs are noticed. Here are two: A third marriage is regarded as unlucky, and when a man has lost two wives and contemplates a third matrimonial venture he often goes through a mock wedding with a sheep, a pigeon or a plant, so that his next wife may be his fourth and not his third.
