**A White Loaf Cake.**  
Dear Miss Grey,—I am going to ask you for a loaf cake made with whites of eggs, three or four. The reason I ask for this is because I have a dark cake recipe that calls for the yolks of eggs. Hoping you can oblige me.

P.S.—I would prefer a loaf cake. I think I have a cake recipe that will just fit nicely. It is called walnut loaf cake: Cream one cup of sugar with one-half cup of butter (or butter substitute) until very creamy. Add one-half cup of teaspoon of vanilla and one-half cup of milk. Sift two cups of flour with three even teaspoons of baking powder three times. Add one cup of walnut or pecan meats (broken fine) to the flour; add this to the first mixture. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of four eggs. Bake, in a loaf, 35 minutes in a moderate oven.

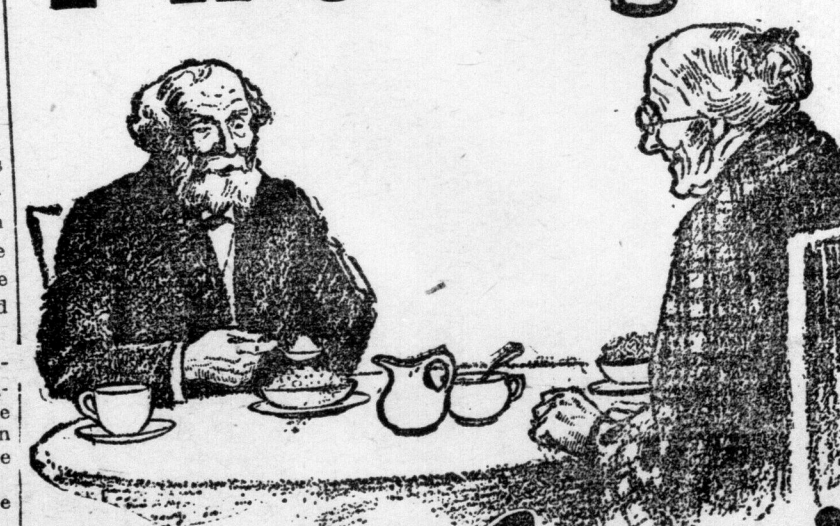

## SAD FACTS ABOUT WIDOWS OF INDIA

Many Thousands of Widows Under Twenty Years—Strange Customs.

There are more than 17,000 widows in India aged five and under.

Such is one of the striking facts recorded in a blue book published recently containing a general report on the census of India in 1911. Of some 800,000 widows of under twenty, more than 94,000 are aged between five and ten.

The population is returned as 315,156,396—more than the whole population of Europe without Russia. In the last thirty-nine years there has been an increase in the population of some fifty millions.

Several curious marriage customs are noticed. Here are two:

A third marriage is regarded as unlucky, and when a man has lost two wives and contemplates a third matrimonial venture he often goes through a mock wedding with a sheep, a pigeon or a plant, so that his next wife may be his fourth and not his third.

In one part of India if an astrologer predicts that a man will have two wives this is taken to mean that his first wife will die—polygamy not being practiced.

If his wife falls sick he therefore goes through a mock marriage with a plantain tree, which is then destroyed. It is believed that this is a fulfillment of the prophecy, and that the real wife will then recover.

Dealing with the question of child marriage, the report says that many low castes are so much in favor of this practice that parents who do not give their children in marriage at an early age find it hard to do afterwards, the idea being that the delay must be due to some mental or physical defect.

A piece of wax paper placed under the centrepiece on a polished table will prevent the linen from adhering to the table in hot weather, as well as prevent a stain from cold water or an overfilled vase or rose bowl.

To prevent strawberries and other canned fruits from forming mold, put a layer of absorbent cotton in the mouth of each jar or can. Any mold that may form will cling to the cotton, leaving the fruit clean.
