Beside the demonstration made in honor of President Carbajal when he was leaving the Chamber of Deputies Building, after aking the oath of office, no other outoursts of importance have occurred. There were a few shouts in the streets of "Down with Huerta," and "Viva Carranza," but the police promptly inter-vened, stopping all such demonstrations.

Gen. Huerta, who remained in the capital some hours after his resignation, is in flight, probably on his way to Puerto, Mexico, to join his family and friends who left for that port a day earlier.
