Four More Posties Received Notices of Their Superannuation Today.

PRINCIPLE LACKING

Members of Local Staff Cannot Understand System of Retirements.

Once again, at a moment's notice, the mighty executioner swings the axe. On this occasion the blow fell again in the local postoffice. This morning the following employees were notified that they had received personal notice from Ottawa that after July 15 they would be placed on the growing list of superannuated: W. P. Burns, William Nicholas, Charles Reid, and Neil McNeill.

In connection with the latest decapitation among the local employees, it is interesting to note that William Nicholas is London's second letter-carrier. His father was a postman before him, and as a boy William helped him on his rounds. In those days the letters were carried around and two cents collected from each person receiving one and one cent for papers. In 1876, Mr. Nicholas left London's first free delivery organization, and he has been a valued employee throughout his career of 42 years at the local office.

There are no principles? "What is the principle under which Ottawa is making these changes?" questioned several members of the staff today. "We cannot really blame the civil service in Ottawa. The commission acts supposedly upon recommendations from London. Well, what happens if the persons who make these recommendations have their own particular axe to grind, or have it 'in for somebody'?"

Just in regard to today's retirements, these men are alleged to be superannuated because they have reached the age of 65, and every year now every bit as well as he did ten or fifteen years ago, and is going to be a number of years yet. Furthermore, he is quite willing to 'carry on'.

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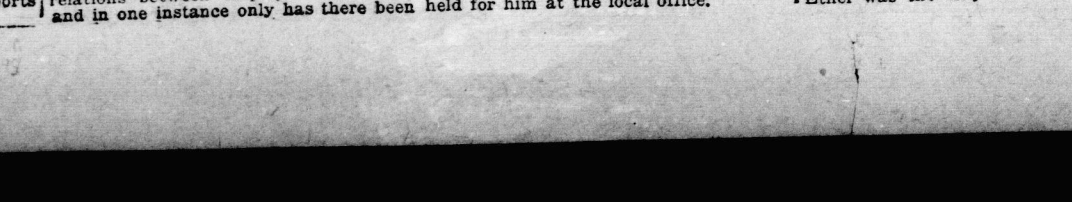
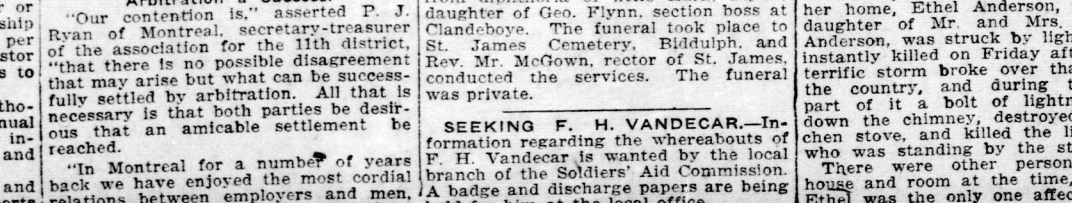
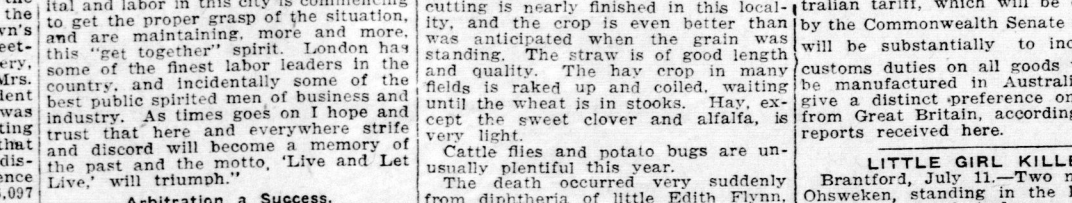
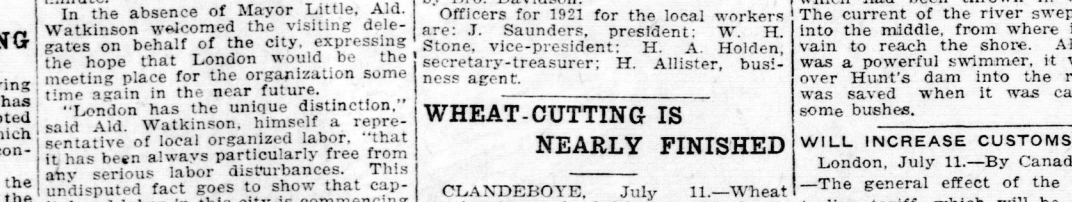
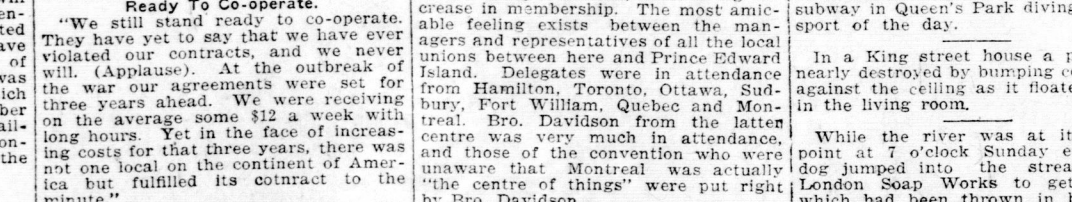
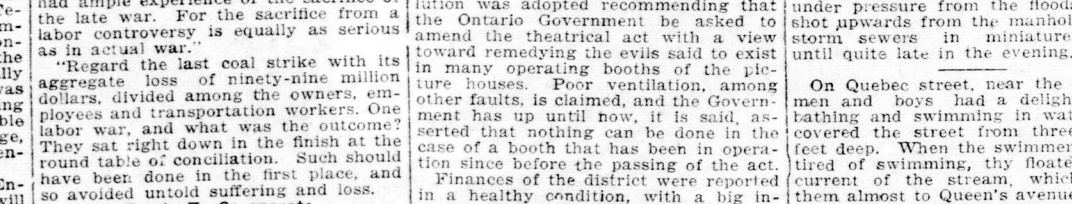
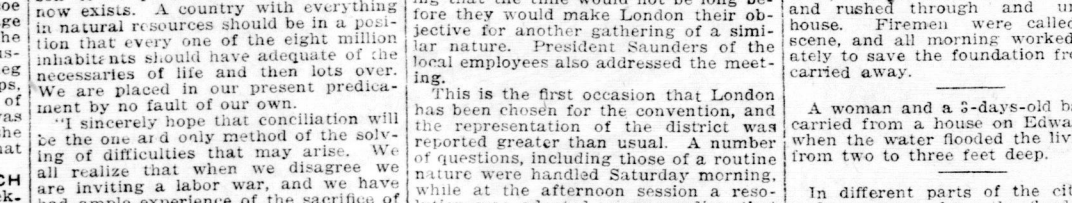
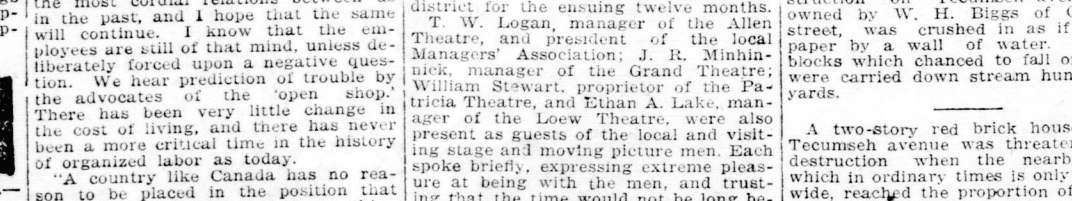
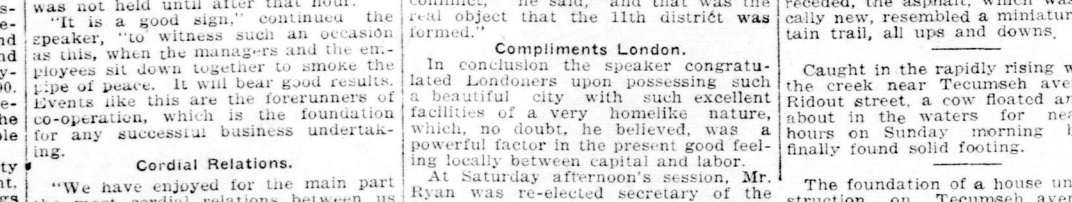
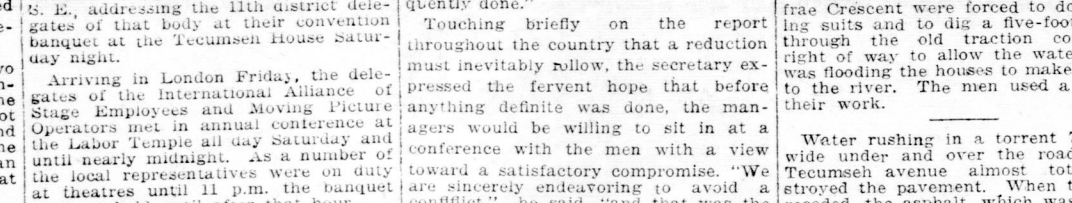
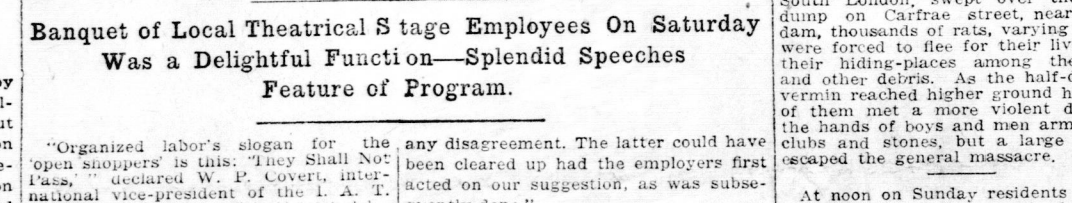
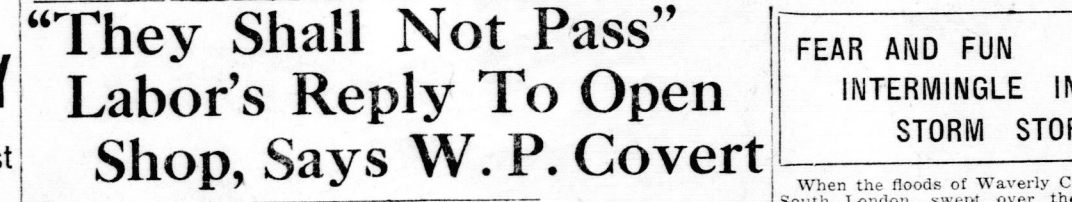
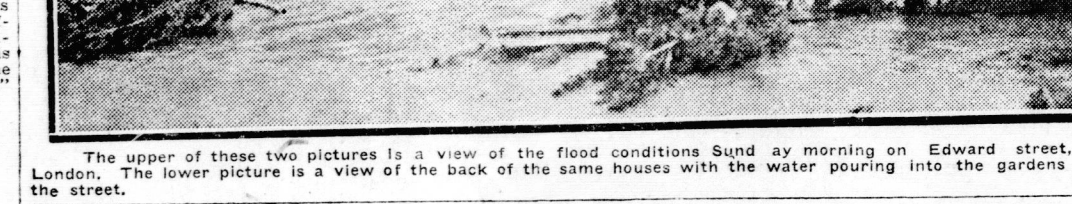
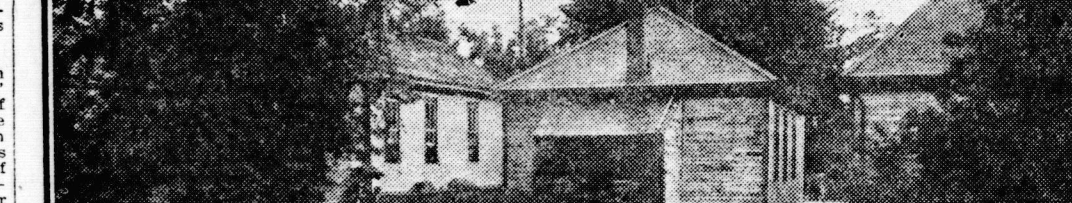
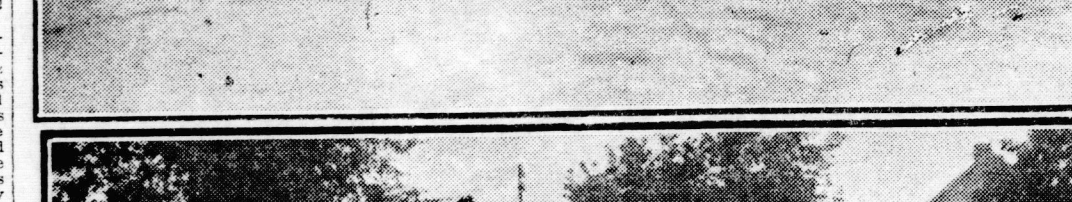
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SOUTH LONDON FLOOD SCENES



LAKE ERIE SEWERS CAUSE OF MUCH LOSS

Ald. Watkinson Declares People Are Much To Blame For Trouble.

Factories Closed

But Staffs Are Employed Clearing Up After Flood.

Ald. F. R. Watkinson, who is acting mayor today, and incidentally was one of the many local victims of the deluge of Sunday, blames the inadequate sewers of the city, and, indirectly, the citizens themselves for much of the damage incurred throughout the city.

"We have been struggling for years to get a proper sewer system," he declared to The Advertiser today, "but the people have voted it down every time. We are not producing any money for the city. It is not only the ratepayers of East London who were hard hit, but those of West London also. The people have got it into their heads that we must have pavements, forgetting all about sewerage system before more pavements are laid. The water will soak through a gravel road and run down the gutter, but not so with a pavement. I lost everything in my cellar Sunday. The flood from London came right into the buildings on Dundas street east."

Sewers Backed Up.

Regarding damage incurred by the McCormick Manufacturing Company on Sunday, Donald C. McNaughton, vice-president, said to The Advertiser this afternoon: "Our damages are about the same as others out there, amounting to about \$2,000. I am not sure if the sewer had acted. The water backed up into our stock room, and we could not do anything until they dry."

As for a remedy for the inadequate sewer Mr. McNaughton said: "The only remedy to complete the system is to run a storm sewer to the river by a side street. At present it extends from the street to the aseptum, and the whole one outlet to take the water from the street. It is a serious thing if the pavement goes further without an additional sewer. We are not producing any money today, but are busy cleaning up."

Similar damages were suffered by H. J. Jones, Limited, who had a large stock of goods in the basement of the damaged stock room. The water was on the job here Sunday afternoon and evening pumping water out of the cellar.

The firemen later reported to the McCormick Manufacturing Company that the water was here until an hour early this morning.

When the floods of Waverly Creek in South London, swept over the city, thousands of rats, varying in size, were forced to flee for their lives from their hiding-places among the alleys and other debris. As the half-drowned vermin reached higher ground hundreds of them met a more violent death at the hands of boys and men armed with clubs and stones, but a large number escaped the general massacre.

At noon on Sunday residents of Carrae Crescent were forced to don bathing suits and to do a five-foot tread on the street. The old traction company's right of way to allow the water which was flooding the houses to make its way through the street.

When the swimmers became tired of swimming, they floated on the water in the street, which was carried them almost to Queen's avenue. At the subway in Queen's Park diving was the sport of the day.

In a King street house a piano was nearly destroyed by bumping continually against the ceiling as it floated around in the living room.

While the river was at its highest point at 7 o'clock Sunday evening, a dog jumped into the stream at the London Soap Works to get a stick which had been thrown in by a boy. The current of the river swept the dog into the middle, from where it tried in vain to reach the shore. Although it was a powerful swimmer, it was swept over Hunt's dam into the rapids. It was saved when it was cast among some bushes.

WILL INCREASE CUSTOMS DUTIES.

London, July 11.—By Canadian Press.—The general effect of the new Australian tariff, which will be considered by the Commonwealth Senate next week, will be substantially to increase the customs duties on all roads which can be manufactured in Australia, but to give a distinct preference on products from Great Britain, according to cable reports received here.

LITTLE GIRL KILLED.

Brantford, July 11.—Two miles from her home, standing in the middle of the road, Mrs. Anderson, 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland, was struck by lightning and killed. A terrific storm broke over that part of the country, and during the worst part of it a bolt of lightning came down the chimney, destroyed the kitchen stove, and killed the little child, who was standing by the stove.

There were other persons in the house and room at the time, but little Ethel was the only one affected.

BELFAST CURFEW REIMPOSED.

Belfast, July 11.—The curfew was reimposed here today as a result of the disorders of Sunday. Belfast now is the only place in Ireland under the curfew regulation, despite the true terms by which the curfew was raised generally.

WOMEN SENT TO PRISON: ADMIT THEFT CHARGES

May Collins and Catherine Waterford, Confessed Shoplifters, Sentenced to Mercer Reformatory—Three Others Remanded.

May Collins, 6394 Queen's avenue, and Catherine Waterford, 1065 York street, confessed shoplifters, were sentenced by Magistrate J. M. Grant in police court this morning to an indefinite term not exceeding two years in the Mercer reformatory.

Three women, Ethel Cambridge, 33 Tecumseh avenue, Edith Cambridge, 33 Tecumseh avenue, and Edna Ingram, 67 Duchess avenue, were remanded one day for sentence, they too, pleading guilty to many thefts in stores.

Mrs. Collins admitted seven separate thefts, five of which were committed, with the aid of Mrs. Waterford. She also pleaded guilty to the five charges. Following is an account of operations as brought out in court:

Both stole dresses and sweaters valued at \$90 from Joseph Mack, Dundas street merchant; one coat, five silk dresses and other articles valued at \$350; wash suits from Griffin & Co., Limited, value \$120; dress valued at \$40 from B. Silverman, 254 Dundas street; two cameras from Stron's drug store. In addition Mrs. Collins "lifted" a wrist watch valued at \$10 while she was in John Barnard's jewelry store, and a gold bracelet set with diamonds and rubies valued at \$85 from W. G. Young's jewelry store.

Ethel Cambridge and Edith Cambridge pleaded guilty to stealing two blouses and two hats valued at \$18 from Smallman & Ingram, and out garments valued at \$22 from Kingsmill's, Limited. Mrs. Ingram admitted that she stole silverware valued at \$14.35 from the Cowan Hardware Company.

When Mrs. Collins and Mrs. Waterford were first asked to plead guilty to the charges, they both said: "Guilty; we're both sorry."

Magistrate Grant told the women: "When this pair were asked if they had anything to say in their defense, they should not be imposed on them. Catherine Waterford said: 'We have children. And you don't know what you're doing. You think you should have been in jail.'" continued the court.

The Cambridge women, who are sisters-in-law of Mrs. Ingram, and whose husbands are brothers, admitted that they had planned to plant a shoplifting. One of them said that her husband gave her every cent that he earned, but she wanted more money. Mrs. Ingram said that she was working with a woman named Mrs. Simpson.

Mrs. Simpson stated that other stores had been robbed by these women, but that information had not been laid against them.

AMERICAN WARSHIPS BACK AT TAMPICCO

Will Remain at Mexican Port Until Situation Clears.

Mexico City, July 11.—United States warships which on Saturday were reported to have been withdrawn from Tampico, returned to that port yesterday afternoon. Dispatches reaching Mexico City last night said the vessels, which were again sent to the mouth of the Panuco River, and although no explanation was given for their return, it was presumed that the situation had cleared.
