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HARRY HEILMANN CHAMPION BATTER

Detroit's Slugging Outfielder Wins by Small Margin.

New York, Oct. 2.—Harry Heilmann, Detroit's slugging outfielder, won the 1921 batting championship in the American League by .0003 point, according to unofficial figures made public today.

Heilmann's boss, Manager Ty Cobb, gave him a merry chase for the title. They were virtually tied when the season closed yesterday, with 330 each, but the figures when carried out to four percentage point gave Heilmann .394 and Cobb .391. Sisler, St. Louis, last year's champion, fourth, .371, and Speaker, Cleveland, fifth, .367.

Heilmann participated in 149 games, was at bat 602 times, scored 113 runs, and made 233 hits. A year ago he ranked 23d in the batting list, with .309.

Cobb, who last year was the ninth ranking American League batsman, with an average of .334, was in 21st place with his rival outfielder, today. He batted 595 times, crossed the plate 122 times, and hit safely 197 times.

Rogers Hornsby, the St. Louis Cardinals' star second baseman, topped the unofficial averages showed, today.

He had a .424 average, but his .394 percentage point was second only to Heilmann's. He also was the National League's leading hitter, with 194 hits in 454 at bats.

Heilmann's 1921 record is five better than his 1920 performance.

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NEW YORK TEAMS READY FOR FRAY

Both Teams Will Go Into the Series With Confidence.

New York, Oct. 2.—With the major league baseball season passed into history, the eyes of the sporting world—those that include nearly everybody—are turning toward the Polo Grounds. There on Wednesday the Giants and the Yankees will begin their struggle for the title of world's champion.

The National League champs finished the season with a defeat by their old rivals, the Brooklyn Superbas yesterday, while the Yankees wound up by winning from the Boston Red Sox. Pittsburgh maintained second place in the National League by a victory over the St. Louis Cardinals, and the St. Louis Browns won third place in the American circuit, by subduing the Detroit Tigers. Cleveland lost its final contest to Chicago.

Some lively hitting featured the final games. Jacobson, St. Louis Browns, cracked the ball safely in each of his five times up and stole three bases.
