An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Dublin today said many big buildings in Cork were in flames, including the offices of the Cork Examiner and the Constitution.

Heavy fighting was still in pro-gress, said the dispatch, although most of the irregulars were believed to have evacuated the city proper.
