DANCING AND MUSIC

The observance of Nov. 30 as St. Andrew's Day, to lovingly perpetuate the memory of Scotland's chosen saint, has long been a time-honored custom "mans' Scots at home and awa'." Wherever a settlement of Scotland's sons is found, whether it be under the unfurled Union Jack or beneath the flying colors of foreign flags, true Scottish folk delight to assemble on November's hindmost day to recite the traditions of their fathers; to eulogize the noble characteristics of their race, and to fittingly honor and cherish the memory of their beloved saint, in whom they have discovered so many of those characteristics which have made Scotland a mighty factor in the molding of the national life of Great Britain.

The St. Andrew's Society of this city has for its 44 year celebration, St. Andrew's night by public assemblies, at which able addresses have been delivered, excellent music discoursed, Scotch dancing has cheered and charmed those assembled, and the spirit of friendship and good fellowship has prevailed.

The gathering of the Scots of London on this memorable occasion is this year to be held at the Tenthredon House. For several weeks an energetic committee of St. Andrew's Society, with London's Scottish bard as its convenor, has been planning and preparing an exceedingly attractive program. No trouble nor expense has been spared to secure speakers and entertainers from a distance, and splendid local talent has also been secured for a night of true enjoyment. Donald MacIntyre, B.A., of Ingersoll, will respond to the toast to Scotland, and C. St. Clair Lett, K.C., of St. Thomas, will reply to the toast to Canada. Both these men are well and favorably known in Western Ontario, and are excellent after-dinner speakers. Will Hollingshead of Dutton will captivate the guests with song and story. Pipers Hamilton, Macdonald and Russell will do credit to the pipes of Bonnie Scotland and will justify the claim that Scottish national airs possess a sweetness which is seldom equalled and never excelled.

Others from this city whose names appear on the program are Rev. Jas. Mackay, B.D., Kenneth Maclean, M.D., Ed. E. Reid, Geo. Garraway, A. G. McCulloch and F. J. Fitzgerald. Rowland Munro, president of the St. Andrew's Society of London, will preside as toastmaster, and Scots from city and surrounding country, as well as many friends of other nationalities, are promised an enjoyable and profitable evening on Nov. 30.

Political Group at Work To Defeat City Hall Bill Is Charge Made by Mayor

Personal Animosity Responsible for Consistent Opposition to McCormick Site.

BLOW AT WENIGE

Charges His Opponents Are Working More Against Him Than Against Bylaw.

Behind the organized opposition to the new city hall going to the people on Monday next Mayor George Wenige sees the hand of the politicians. His worship suspects that opposition from a certain quarter is directed more at him than at the bylaw, and superinduced by the desire of certain petty ward politicians who would defeat the city hall simply because the mayor has consistently advocated the construction of the new hall on the McCormick site.

At recent public mass meetings his opponents have projected into the light reasons why the hall should not be constructed at this time. Reference was made at the Talbot street school to the expected cost of the new structure when occupied. "I would set \$30,000 as an extreme figure," he stated. "What do they suppose we are going to do with the present equipment in the old city hall when we move into the new building? We are certainly not going to junk what furniture we have in the various offices, our filing cabinets and so forth. I feel confident that \$30,000 will suffice for any additional equipment that may be needed, and I think even that is a high estimate."

The mayor points out that while the bylaw asks for another \$500,000, this amount will not be required. He has charged at all the public meetings in the present campaign that this figure was set by his opponents in the council to reduce the chances for the success of the measure at the polls.

The mayor also points out that the cost of the new hall—\$600,000, as set by the bylaw—is not such a formidable figure when spread over a period of twenty years, as contemplated. "A person with a \$1,500 assessment would be called upon to pay only 62½ cents a year for twenty years," he explained. "A person with a \$3,000 assessment would be called upon to pay about \$1.25, and so on in accordance with their assessment. These costs are not excessive, when one considers them fairly."

WOMAN IS FREED ON FRAUDULENT CREDIT CHARGE

Mrs. Alma Tangredi Obtained \$15 Hat—Acted Foolishly, Says Magistrate.

CLAIMS ACCOUNT

Mrs. Alma Tangredi, charged in police court today with having fraudulently and fraudulently obtaining credit from Mrs. J. E. Whitton, milliner, 497 Richmond street, was dismissed on the charge by Magistrate Graydon.

Mrs. Whitton stated that Mrs. Tangredi purchased a \$15 hat from her some week ago, and paid \$1 down. Later she secured a check for \$14 from the defendant, and the next day the bank notified her that the check was no good.

Questioned by Mr. Cousins, of the law firm of T. W. Scudett, who was acting for the defence, Mrs. Whitton admitted having been fully paid for the hat after court action was started.

Mrs. Tangredi, who is but 19 years of age, said that prior to her marriage her name was Antone, and that was the name she signed to the check. Her husband told her to get the hat and pay for it by check, as he had started an account for her in the Bank of Montreal.

"I didn't know the check was no good," said the defendant. "I thought there was money in my name." Questioned by J. G. Gillanders, acting for the crown, Mrs. Tangredi stated her husband had not been paying her mother any board, and said he was saving the money for her in the bank.

"Do you know whether you have any money in the bank now?" asked Mr. Gillanders.

"No, sir. I've never been to the bank," Mrs. Tangredi replied. "My husband told me he was putting it in and I had five with him. The check is dated Oct. 8, and he left the city Oct. 10. He said he was putting the money in the market branch of the Bank of Montreal."

Mrs. Tangredi went on to say that she didn't know the bank book. He had shown it to her, but she didn't notice how much was in the bank. She had never given a check like that before.

Mrs. Zaccano, mother of the defendant, said her son-in-law had told her to give her money in her daughter's name.

"The check is signed 'Mrs. A. Antone,' and there is no such person," said the court. "She gave a check to the bank, and added to it, 'I think the girl acted very wrongly, but I'm going to dismiss the charge.'"

News From City Churches

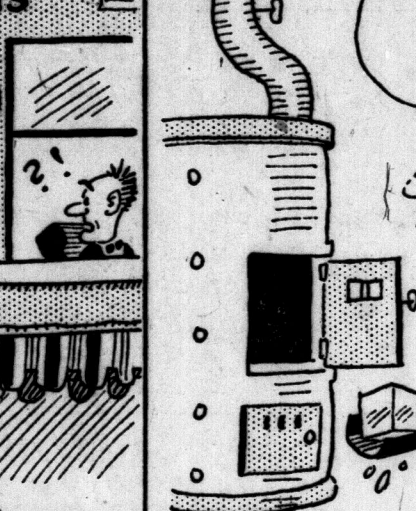

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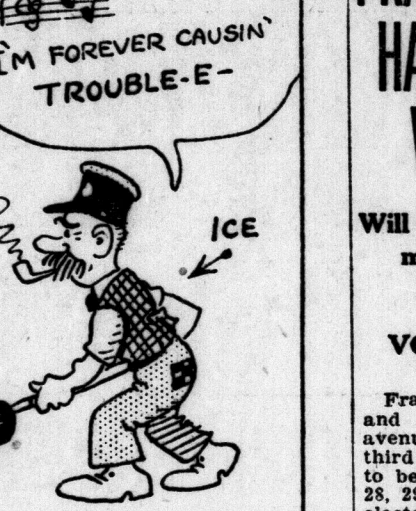
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VOTING NOT HEAVY

LEAVES REPORT

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Although the voting was not as heavy as at first expected, every ballot cast was done so with enthusiasm and eagerness according to Secretary Spearman of the Y. M. C. A. The 218 voters in this group who cast their ballot for their favorite nominee waited anxiously around the "Y" building on Saturday to hear the results. When it was announced that Adams and Upshall would go to Toronto as representatives of the boys of this city, a loud cheer was given the two successful candidates.

The Runners-Up. Robert Ferguson, Worley road, came third in the race, with 55 votes cast in his favor. Ben Foulkes was second behind with 51, and Stanley Gemmill received 46 votes.

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Engineer Curd Declares Prospects Show Plenty For Bigger London.

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The survey for ground water which Engineer C. A. Curd, Chicago, has been conducting for the past seven weeks has been completed and Mr. Curd will leave for the American city this week.

The report to be presented to the public utilities commission is now in course of preparation and will be presented at the next meeting, December 6.

Mr. Curd is more than satisfied with the results of his operations and is leaving London confident that if his recommendations are carried out, the city will have sufficient water to last them many years, even though the population increase at a fast rate.

Although the engineer is leaving the city his work will be carried on by one of the engineers of the commission who has been instructed in the method of searching for water by water drilling.

No wells will be drilled on the site of the holes put down by Engineer Curd for some time as the search was conducted with the object of finding a supply to take care of the London of the future. This has been done and as needed the wells will be sunk. All information and data concerning the different sections of the district where Mr. Curd worked, together with any recommendations, will be received by the commission and used as the need arises.

In leaving the city Mr. Curd feels that his work has been well worth while from a utilitarian point, as water curd has been brought to the surface in sufficient quantities to take care of a much larger London.

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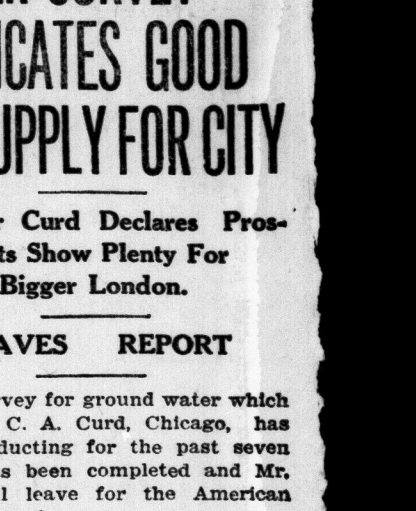
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
