Mrs. Mathewson, who has been in constant attendance at the bedside of her husband ever since he was forced to give up active participation in the affairs of the Boston club, was with baseball's greatest idol when he died. His son, Christy Mathewson, Jun., is at

Known by baseball fans for a quarter of a century and placed by them on a high pinnacle of worship, Christy Mathewson was idoled for his sterling work and character. He first became famous when with the New York Giants, and was a bosom friend of John J. McGraw, dynamic leader of the team which so long held the

leadership in the baseball world. His greatest feat in baseball was when he blanked the Philadelphia Americans three times when they were playing off with the New York Giants for the world's championship in 1905.

His character was such that typified him as the best that baseball has ever produced. When the call came he entered the service of his country in the great war and came back a tubercular. He went to recuperate at Saranac Lake, and for a long time baseball fandom watched his struggle to regain health. Last year he came back apparently victor in the fight, and became president and part owner of the Boston Braves. Thousands of admirers and well-wishers welcomed him and thought that he had won another great victory.

Several weeks ago there were rumors that he had suffered a relapse, but they were denied. His death comes as a great shock not only to baseball followers, but to all the public as well.
