In the population section it was shown that births in Japan are at the rate of 3.88 a minute, while deaths occur at the rate of 2.4 a minute, leaving a net rate of 1.4 a minute, leaving a net gain of 1.48 a minute. anese birth and death rates, figured in that way, were shown to be the highest among the nations of the world. As to births, Germany came after Japan with slightly less than three a minute; Britain was next with a little

more than two, and France showed prate of one and one-half a minute.
