TOWNS NOT PLEASED WITH GAELIC NAMES

Bray Decides Against Changing
to Bri-Chualann—Others
Undecided.

Dublin, Oct. 29.—The changing of
the names of Irish towns into Gaelic
forms has received a check by the
decision of Bray, which had been al-
tered to Bri Chualann, to revert to
its familiar designation. It is a favor-
able watering place and visitors, es-
pecially strangers, were unable to
recognize it under the Gaelic name.
Kingstown has not thought it
necessary to abandon its new-old
name of Dun Laoghaire. The name
Kingstown 100 years ago replaced
the old name of Dunleary, but Dun-
leary is again the accepted name,
and the only objection is to the spell-
ing of it, which puzzles a stranger.
Many of the Gaelic names, though
they have received official sanction
and appear on the postage, have not
come into general use. Dublin is still
Dublin and not Baile Atha Cliath,
while comparatively few people
recognize Na hAn Uaimh. But
Cobh, pronounced Cove, has perma-
nently displaced Queenstown, as the
southern port was called in honor
of Queen Victoria.

BIRTH RATE IN BRITAIN NEARLY TWO A MINUTE

Japanese Record Leads All the
World With Four a
Minute.

Associated Press Despatch.
Osaka, Oct. 29.—Illustrations at the
recent national statistics exhibition
showed that the population of Japan is
increasing at the rate of approximately
three persons every two minutes. Cal-
culating backwards, the latest inven-
tion was exhibited, as also were charts
and drawings illustrating all kinds of
statistics.

In the population section it was
shown that births in Japan are at the
rate of 2.58 a minute, while deaths oc-
cur at the rate of 2.4 a minute, leaving
a net gain of 1.18 a minute. The Jap-
anese birth and death rates, figured in
that way, were shown to be the highest
among the nations of the world.
As to births, Germany came after
Japan with slightly less than three a
minute; Britain was next with a little
more than two, and France showed a
rate of one and one-half a minute.
Other statistics which attracted at-
tention showed that in 1913 Osaka con-
sumed luxuries valued at 1,200,000 yen,
while the value of luxuries consumed in
1923 had increased to 7,300,000 yen.

the boys from Camp Orava.

Boy Finds It Impossible To Live On \$12,000 Annually

Petitions Count for Extra Al-
lowance of \$4,500 to Live
Comfortably.

Honolulu, Oct. 17.—Mrs. Elizabeth
Knight of Los Gatos, Cal., recently
appeared with her 12-year-old grand-
son, Richard Parker Smart, before
Judge John R. Desha, of the court
of domestic relations, and complai-
ned that it has been very difficult for
young Richard to live within his an-
nual allowance of \$12,000. The boy,
owner of the large Parker ranch on
the island of Hawaii, is reputed to
be a millionaire. The grandmother,
as his guardian, petitioned the court
to increase the allowance to \$16,500,
which was granted.

Mrs. Knight told the court that the
servants employed in her home for
the benefit of young Richard cost
approximately \$400 a month. In ad-
dition to the increased annual allow-
ance the court authorized an expendi-
ture of \$2,500 to cover the cost of
the boy's vacation in Hawaii and
\$1,800 for distribution by the young-

cattle ranch when he visits his prop-
erty to be the guest of the staff and
cowboys.

ously considered withdrawing alto-
gether from the proceedings in par-
liament as a protest. Thomas John-
