TO THE ELECTORS

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I would kindly ask you to read over this circular.
The Town Treasury has lost about \$10,000 on Local Improvement taxes during the past ten years. I can assist in collecting a large portion of the money if I am a member of Council in 1909.

Factory Exemptions.

This has been a custom contrary to law for years past to give a nominal assessment to factories to locate in Berlin, to give employment to labor.
The principle is attended with danger in continuity, the low assessment on a factory, after the term expires, and in giving a ridiculous low assessment to some wealthy manufacturers, who could well afford to pay for higher assessment after exemptions have run out, the factory should be assessed at a reasonable amount to help pay the heavy burden of taxes which must necessarily fall upon the house owners.

When we consider the fact of other property assessed at full value, and a 20 mill rate on assessment, besides the Local Improvement Tax which will be 4 mills, in all 24 mills, to say the least, it is unfair and should be adjusted to a more equitable basis in future. The taxes including local improvements, should not exceed 21 mills. There are seven factory exemptions expiring in 1909, and in future should be assessed at some reasonable amount. I will mention them, and you can draw your own conclusions why Mr. McBride is anxious to be Mayor, to look to his own interest, and that of the Manufacturer's Association, and have assessment renewed for a longer term of years. During the former years, when I was a member of Council, we agreed to have all the exemptions expire in 1909, after which we fully intended to raise the assessment to a fair amount. If I am a member of Council in 1909, you can depend I will do my best to that end. I am a candidate of no person, or persons, perfectly independent.

I ask your support entirely on my ability to be for your interests, if elected. I promise you to still reduce in 1909 our rate to 19 mills instead of 20 mills as in 1908 and 21 in 1909, with our \$121,000 increase of assessment and collection on back Local Improvements and less General Debentures to pay in 1909, it is practical with no detriment to progress. I have been nine years in Council, chairman of all committees, fought many hard hours at Council for your benefit.

This year we engaged our engineer on salary for \$1,908.00. In former years he received five per cent. on all works constructed. During the year 1908 we constructed \$38,175.00 on local improvements. We charged up to local improvements five per cent. for engineering expenses which gave us \$1,908.74 which paid for our engineer's salary and expenses, consequently the salary for engineer did not cost the general tax payer one cent.

King Street Pavement.

This work should be constructed on local improvements and paid for by the property owners benefited, the same as other streets in the Corporation. The Street Railway must construct between tracks and 12 inches on either side the cost of which they can issue debentures for, the cost of all crossings to be paid out of the general fund.

Some seven years ago we gave a bonus of \$25,000 to their factory on certain conditions which were to be embodied in an agreement between the Company and the Corporation of the Town of Berlin. The money was paid over, we have not the agreement and I understand the Town never did have one. We pay every year \$1,263.00 in debentures to pay this bonus given. We only receive \$600.00 for school taxes. We have yet to pay 33 years' debentures.

The neglect of duty on the part of our Mayor at that time deserves censure for not having the agreement properly executed.

I consider it should be assessed at a nominal sum sufficient to cover at least the yearly debentures we pay, especially when they have failed to comply with the conditions for which they received our money.

The clause in By-law gives Berlin Corporation power to collect from Sugar Co., \$3,500.00 per year if they fail to run factory for two years; in 1909 the two years time for not operating it, will be up. If elected I will see that this clause is carried out.

Police Commission.

I am the introducer of this by-law and will vote in favor of the Police Commission in preference to a Police Committee of Council to govern over our police.

I consider it to be the best interest of law and order and for the public good, and free from any influences which could be brought to bear over an elective body of Police Committee.

The costs are no more under one than the other, especially from the time our Police Magistrate has been placed on salary.

If you are in favor of the Police Commission, mark your ballot against dissolution, if you are against the Commission mark your ballot for dissolution.

For or against dissolution is what the Act calls for and must be put on the ballot. I do not attend ward meetings nor personally canvass for votes. I appeal to electors from the public platform and through the press. A public meeting will be held at the Opera House Saturday evening at 8 o'clock p.m. for discussion of municipal affairs.

I claim to be instrumental in securing our Park By-law, our addition to market from late Casper Heller, Franchise Tax By-law, the introduction of the Street Railway some years ago.

I have never had the honor of being your Mayor. I consider I am entitled to that position over any of my opponents when long service and experience are considered.

I only ask from you electors what is due me, fair treatment as I have been honest with you for nine years. Trusting to the intelligent and honest electorate for a renewal of confidence for Mayor in 1909.
