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RESTIGOUCHE RIFLEMEN TO COMPETE FOR PRIZES IN LABOR DAY SHOOTING EVENT

Seven Teams Consisting of Six Members Each Are Entered—Three Prizes To Be Awarded For High Team Scores And One Individual Prize For Each Team Provided—Names Of The Members

The Rifle Range of the Restigouche Military Association at Tide Head will be a centre of special interest for members of that organization on Labor Day, Monday Sept. 7th, when a special shooting competition will be held there.

FOREST FIRES REPORTED

Chatham, N. B., Aug. 31.—Two big forest fires are reported to be raging in the vicinity of Tracadie. One had its origin near Inkerman and is believed to have been started by sparks from the train. The other first showed up at Six Roads and extends to Tracadie wharf. The latter is the larger of the two and extends for seven miles with a breadth of half a mile. The origin of this one is not known, but it is believed to have been caused by carelessness or intention. There are large crowds of men trying to subdue the flames but so far their efforts have not had very much effect. Four cows and 18 sheep were overtaken and destroyed by the flames near Tracadie. Three miles of main road between Six Roads and Green Point was completely closed to traffic Friday by fire and smoke and a detour had to be made by a shore road by those who would pass that way.—Gleason.

BRITISH EDITORS MUCH IMPRESSED

Say Maritime Districts Would Make Good Homes for British Settlers.

St. John, N. B., Sept. 1.—That there was room for wider advertising of the Maritime Provinces and that there was no doubt that they had been neglected, were opinions expressed by members of the party of ten British journalists now touring Canada as guests of the Canadian Pacific Railway, when they passed through St. John last night on their way to Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and the west of Canada.

The party had completed a tour through the Annapolis Valley to Halifax, making the trip to Yarmouth on the way from here. They were particularly struck by the similarity between the farms of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and those in the English possession.

They also expressed their admiration for the Maritime farming districts would make admirable homes for British settlers.

STEWART TO BE MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS

Personel of The Cabinet Is Now Fairly Well Decided On.

The personnel of the new cabinet which will succeed the Veniot Government early in September has been pretty well decided upon, according to members-elect of the new Legislature who have been amongst the many conferring since the election with Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, who is to be called to the Premiership when Hon. P. J. Veniot's resignation is placed in the hands of Lieutenant Governor Todd.

According to one of the members-elect, who was in the city during the week end, the cabinet slate has been definitely settled and, unless changes are made in the meanwhile Hon. Dr. Baxter will submit the following slate when called upon by the Governor to form a cabinet.

Premier and Attorney General—Hon. J. B. M. Baxter.

Minister of Public Works—D. A. Stewart, Restigouche.

Minister of Lands and Mines—C. D. Richards, York.

Minister of Agriculture—Lewis Smith, Albert.

Minister of Health—Dr. H. I. Taylor, Charlotte.

Provincial Secretary and Treasurer—A. J. Leeger, Westmoreland.

Members without portfolio—E. A. Reilly, K. C. Moncton, and either L. P. D. Tilley, K. C. of St. John, or Col. W. H. Harrison, K. C. of St. John.

Reilly Doesn't Want Portfolio

It is understood that Mr. Reilly, because of his extensive and important business and professional connections, is adverse to accepting the responsibilities of a portfolio in the new Government.

There is some likelihood, it appears, of Mr. Tilley being the Conservative candidate for St. John—Albert in the Federal elections and, if Federal elections occur before the Provincial Legislature meets and Mr. Tilley is a candidate, then the selection of Col. Harrison for a place in the cabinet is said to be certain.

H. V. Dickson May Be Speaker

From the same source which came the cabinet slate, it is learned that the big lumbermen of the North Shore have been urging the appointment of J. Leonard O'Brien, one of the members-elect for Northumberland, as Minister of Lands and Mines. He is a member of the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association.

It is said that H. V. Dickson, veteran member for Kings, is the present choice for the Speakership.

Meanwhile preparations are going on for the winding-up meeting of the Veniot Government on Thursday.

LOCAL MERCHANTS INVOLVED IN AD. SWINDLE

Hayes and Hines, Now In New-castle Jail, Sold Space Here In Their Proposed Publication.

L. T. Hayes and Thos. G. Hines, now up for hearing in Newcastle on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, did not overlook Campbellton in the course of their activities. Some ten local merchants subscribed for space in the magazine they stated they were issuing and which is alleged to be fraud.

Arrested in Bathurst.

The pair were arrested on Saturday night by Chief of Police Hopkins of Newcastle and taken to that town where the preliminary hearing of their case opened on Monday before Magistrate Demers.

Province-Wide Swindle

The pair, who had, according to records found on them, been operating in several towns in New Brunswick and Quebec, had solicited advertisements for an alleged Catholic publication which they said they were to issue.

In Campbellton.

Arriving here the pair interviewed local merchants and explained their business. They stated that the proposed Catholic publication would contain a history of Roman Catholic Church work here. They had secured a letter from Father McInnis and also submitted this for the perusal of those they sought to interest. Their proposition was evidently well put as several merchants thought it looked feasible and bought space.

One Futile Call

The pair made at least one futile call while in town. Entering a certain local store they approached the proprietor and explained that the names of all those taking space in the new publication would be announced from the pulpit by the parish priest here. They vaguely conveyed the idea that if the merchants realized the value of this they would not miss an opportunity to obtain space in the publication.

This however did not meet with this merchants idea of doing business and he informed his visitors that if he had to resort to such measures to get along, he would "sell out his business and move on."

Will Prosecute

Just what will be done in regard to these activities here depends on the proceedings at Newcastle. The merchants interested, however, have requested J. A. Creagan, L. L. B. of that town, to act as their attorney against the pair in the event of their not being prosecuted at Newcastle.

Yesterday Hayes and Hines were remanded to jail until word could be secured as to their operations in Ontario where they are said to have carried on a similar scheme.

The lad, who miraculously escaped unscathed in the catastrophe, is the first of the family to return to the city after the fateful event. He will probably begin his studies in North End when the schools re-open Monday. Mr. Mence is still in the Campbellton Hospital as is also the daughter, Kathleen, aged 17.

A Little Hero.

It transpires that Master Harold Mence was a hero in the sad affair. When the car had landed on the rocks, after its long drop, he was first to extricate himself from the wreckage and free his mother. At the time he did not know she was dead. The nurse, Miss Holly, and the boy's sister were both practically unconscious from shock and the father suffering greatly from his injuries.

Harold batted his father's face and ministered diligently first aid to the best of his knowledge. It is expected it will be fully a fortnight longer before H. A. Mence and his daughter can be removed to Saint John.

CHARGE NEGLIGENCE OF SHIP'S OFFICERS

Washington, Sept. 1.—The Federal government's investigation of the explosion aboard the Mackinac, of Newport, August 18, which caused 52 deaths, resulted yesterday in charges of negligence being placed by the commerce department's Steamboat Inspection Service against George W. Mevey, master of the vessel, and John A. Grant, its chief engineer.

The two officers were ordered to trial September 2 before a local board of local steamboat inspectors for the district of Providence. If convicted, they face revocation of their licences as navigators, and any action against them under criminal laws being in the hands of states attorneys.

VOCATIONAL BOARD MET LAST WEEK

Six Vocational Schools Will be in Operation When Fall Term Opens.

The New Brunswick Vocational Board met this morning for the purpose of cleaning up several items of business and of preparing for the resignation of the Provincial Government business requiring action before the board. Only a bare quorum was present including Hon. Fred Magee, chairman of the board, George B. Maxwell of St. John, Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, and Harvey Mitchell, Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

The final plans and specifications of the composite high schools to be erected at Campbellton and New-Mann, Miss Katherine, student-nurse were submitted to the board and were approved and passed to the Board of Education, which meets tomorrow, for final action. It was announced that six vocational schools will be in operation with the opening of the fall term.

Reports submitted for the board's consideration showed that during the past school year attendance at the night vocational classes had been increased 38 per cent, as compared with the previous year, while there had also been a 20 per cent. increase in the attendance at the day classes throughout the province.

GLOOMY OUTLOOK OF N. B. LUMBERMEN

Call for Relief for "Heavy Taxation."

The lumbermen of New Brunswick met at Douglastown on Tuesday of last week in conference as to ways and means they can best adopt to not only carry on but if at all possible increase operations in order to give employment and assist in restoring prosperity to the province. The consensus of opinion was that it was absolutely necessary to obtain relief from the present heavy taxation now in force in order to be able to secure the necessary banking accommodation to carry on their operations. Further, it was the unanimous opinion that under present conditions it is not possible to increase operations in any way, or even to continue making lumber with the unfavorable competition now facing the industry in this province. A committee was appointed to deal with the stumpage and other dues, and report back to a later meeting of the Association.

It was moved by W. E. Snowball, M. P., seconded by Richard O'Leary and carried—

Resolved, That in the opinion of the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association in meeting today at Douglastown, all goods and supplies required in the production of logs, lumber, paper, pulp, and other wood products should preferably be the manufacture of the province of New Brunswick, and purchased from New Brunswick dealers, and failing this should be of Canadian manufacture.
