### THE SQUIER INVESTIGATION.

Yesterday Chief Justice Wilson delivered judgment on the application for a writ of prohibition to restrain the commissioner, ointed by the Dominion government to enquire into the conduct of Judge Squier, of the county of Huron, from acting. His lordship held that the commission was void, as there is no jurisdiction in any case void, as there is no juristication in any case to issue a commission to enquire into a judge's conduct. He held that the court of impeachment, which had been done away with by the local legislature, still existed, as that government had no power to repeal the act creating it. He presumed there would be no necessity to issue a writ of prohibition as the commissioner would discontinue proceedings on hearing of the judgment.
