The annual reports of the Bureau of Industries for Ontario for the year 1898 states: It happens very rarely that any one has been able to give the fullest details of the mineral resources of a country.

For the six years, 1893-6, the total value of the minerals exported was \$19,690,064. The leading articles are copper, iron, zinc, lead, silver, nickel, and coal.

Comparing the exports of 1898 with the average of the six years, there is an increase in coal, gold, iron, zinc, lead, silver, nickel, and copper.
