Perhaps it was through inadvertence that the Toronto contingent of the Executive Committee called the annual meeting of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at the hour they did; but in view of the important business to be transacted, including election of officers, considering proposed by-laws, etc., which will consume considerable time, it was certainly inconsiderate of the comfort and convenience of the members who do not reside in Toronto, to ask them to meet at two o'clock in the afternoon, when many of them would have to leave within two hours to enable them to catch the afternoon trains for their homes. The work in view cannot be accomplished in the time allowed; and an evening session means that important business would have to be left to be transacted by the Toronto members after the others had departed. ## BRITISH CANADIAN TRADE.

The following enquiries have been received at the office of the High Commissioner of Canada in London, England.

125. A West of England firm makes enquiry respecting the export of tallow and grease from the Dominion, and asks for the names of shipping houses.

126. Enquiry is made for the names of importers of gauge glasses and glass tubes of every description for the Canadian market.

127. The sole agencies in France for leading manufacturers and exporters who desire to be represented in that country, are desired by a gentleman who offers good references.
