The Montreal Lawn Temmis Challange Cup (solid silver value $\$ 100$ ), for simgle matehes, will be offered for competition at this meeting, under the following conditions:

1. The Coj shall be played for at the Amond Tourmament of the Montreal Lawn 'lemis Club, on their gromeds in Montreal, and shall become the property of the winner in two successive or any thre competitions.
2. The Gup shat be held in trust by the M. L. 'I. C., as trustees for the winners until finally won, and a suitable prize will be presented to the winner in cach competition.

A remurkably neat programme has been istued by the Camadian Association of Amateru Oarsmen, for their seventh mamal regata, to be held on Saturday, Aug. Th., open to the world. The course is one mile and a half straightanay on Lake St. Louis; Lachine, T. Q .

The maces are open to the members of all Camadimn Amateur Rowing Clubs, aftiliated with this Association, which have heen daly organized three months prior to the holding of this Regatta. and to all Chabs in the United States recognized Wy the Natiomal Association of Amaterr Oarsmen. 6. Single-Seull Inrigged hace, (iold Medal: and Jrize, Silver Cup.
7. Donble-Scall lariged hace. Two silver Cups.

The Jumiors are also ahove the aremge and showing up well for their chass ; werytheng consideren, we think that there will he seen over the Lathine course on the ith Alugst, some of the finest four oared rowing ever witnasied on this continent, and that alone ought to be sufficient toattate an immense number of rpectators.

'The Jmaiors are doing well, lout are pulling a little short and want to streteh themselves ont more: stioke and thre have a tendency to pull out of the loat, and shoukd wateh themselves. They ate pulling strong and well together, but we wouhd he better pheased if their recovery was quicker and more mifum.
