MAINLAND CHINA—POSSIBILITY OF RECOGNITION

Mr. H. W. Herridge (Kootenay West): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address a question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. My question is based on an address given by the Minister of Veterans Affairs on behalf of the Prime Minister to the council of world veterans federations in Toronto yesterday. For the UN to secure a valid mandate to intervene with effect anywhere in the world, its membership should include states everywhere in the world.

I will investigate whether discussions have taken place between my officials and the officials of the health department of Ontario.

MORALITY IN GOVERNMENT AND PARLIAMENT —NEED FOR REFORM

Mr. R. Gordon L. Fairweather (Royal): Mr. Speaker, the institution of parliament is on trial and we who are its present members, I submit, are in danger of being accused of standing by while what some think of as its splendid purposes are destroyed by those whose conception of its role is narrow and mean. Bruce Hutchison in the Ottawa Journal for April 30 last wrote in another context, but the application of his words is relevant:

. . . the largest question in the western world remains unanswered. It is whether, against the proliferating state, the individual can survive; whether the collective roof will fall in, under its own weight, and crush the private human beings who built it. Some day, perhaps, our politicians will get around to thinking about these matters but at the moment they are otherwise engaged in their jolly sham battle fought with spitballs and mud.
