torians, We are informed that this Project was of an older Date; that the Earl of Nottingham, previous to his Refignation of the Poft of Lord High-Admiral of England, had earneftly follicited the King to engage in Preparations for fuch' an Enterprize; that Sir Robert Manfel had ftrongly intimated to Buckingham that it would reflect the highest Lustre on his Abilities in the naval Department, if the Expedition took Place, at the Dawn of his Administration. As this fortunate, and afpiring Favourite too eafily induced the Sovereign to confent to the Gratification of all his Wifnes, it is reafonable to fuppose that, through his Influence, the Project was carried into Execution; notwithstanding that Sir William Monfon, who had been confulted, delivered an Opinion, supported by strong, and clear Arguments, that it was rafh, and ill-founded; and that, inftead of raifing the Reputation of the naval Power of the English, it would only contribute to render them ridiculous, as the whole World would observe the Difappointment; whereas but Few could judge of its real Caules, or of the Injustice of measuring thereby the maritime Strength of Britain (...).
