LONDON, March 23.—(C.A.P.)—The first of two liners which have been commissioned by the Cunard Company for Canadian passengers this summer, was launched Saturday at Greenock. The "Andania" is a handsome vessel of 13,000 tons, with accommodations for over two thousand second and third-class passengers.

The comfort of the passengers has been especially studied in designing the staterooms. There is an unusual number of two berth rooms. The ship is fitted with Marconi wireless apparatus, submarine signaling, bilge keels and watertight doors.
