

Reports emanating from Mexico City last night that an American warship had bombarded Manzanillo. on the Pacific coast of Mexico, and that American marines had landed at Salina Cruz caused officials here con-siderable concern. Both reports being untrue, they feared that they might have been circulated in Mexico for the purpose of arousing resentment against Americans. The hope here is that no untoward incidents will arise to ham-per the peace negotiations.




