There are three things of which the man who aims at the character of a prosperous farmer will never be niggardly—manure, tillage, and seed; and there are three things of which he will never be too liberal—promises, time, and credit. Pigs that come in March, and are intended to be killed in December, should be well fed from the time of weaning, and have a run in good clover where there is plenty of water—and as soon as the harvesting of potatoes commences should be confined and fed with boiled potatoes, with a few pumpkins, beets, or carrots—grain or roots, for fattening neat stock or swine, will go about a third further if steamed or boiled, than if used raw.
