PARADE OF UNEMPLOYED

Now That Demonstrations Have Become Political, Public Ignores Them.

London, Feb. 12.—There was another march of the "unemployed" in the streets of London this afternoon, with the object of impressing the new government and legislators, but the demonstration fell flat. The march was nearly half the length of previous demonstrations and the attitude of the public towards the subscription collectors showed that interest in the "peevy parade" has been decidedly waning since they took on a distinctly political character.

GOODMAN IS GRANTED BAIL

Altho Police Would Like to Keep Him in Detention. Yesterday afternoon T. C. Robinette, K.C., succeeded in inducing Judge Winchester to grant an order for bail for Charles Goodman, whose trial will be resumed on March 3, on the charge of receiving \$4500 worth of goods stolen from J. & J. Langdon, Montgomery Street, and other firms. Bail was fixed at \$2000 cash and a bond of \$2000, furnished by Goodman himself. Mr. Robinette was busy last night endeavoring to collect the necessary cash, but failed to do so. The news that the accused was to be given his liberty was not received with enthusiasm by the police. Goodman gave them a lot of trouble and for a time put every obstacle in their way to prevent the stolen goods being recovered. Had it not been for Crown Attorney Curry's firm stand in refusing to accept a cash bail of \$2000 in police court it is very doubtful if the missing goods would have turned up.

DETECTIVE'S HOME-GOING

Mr. Mackie Will Combine Pleasure With Stern Business. Detective Mackie will leave this morning for London, Eng. He is going there after Chris Holroyd, manager of the Ideal Bedding Company, who was charged with the firm, \$13,800, in his accounts. Mackie was a member of the London police force for some time and was attached to the Bow-street station, where he expects to meet some of his old comrades.

SIX LIVES LOST IN FLAMES

One Man Sacrificed in His Attempt to Save Horses. Portland, Ore., Feb. 12.—At least six persons lost their lives in a fire that swept a busy commercial district at the east end of the Morrison-street bridge today. Ten or more persons were seriously injured and two removed to hospitals. The fire broke out in a building on the east side of the bridge, near the intersection of the street with the river. The fire spread rapidly and in a few minutes the building was a mass of flames. The fire department arrived in time to save the horses in the stable, but the fire was too far advanced to be controlled. The loss is \$30,000.

STEAM TRAWLER VERONICA SINKS WITH CREW OF TEN

London, Feb. 12.—The steam trawler Veronica, belonging to Stavanger, Norway, has been lost off Looe, Cornwall, England. The vessel was carrying a crew of ten. She was disabled when the rope broke. The company has sent a launch to look for the boat, but when within 35 feet of the vessel she capsized and they were all drowned.

PROVIDENCE IS KINDLY SAVES 3 YOUNG LIVES

Kington, Feb. 12.—Last night Ed Cook checked his cook stove full of wood, and with his family went to a business meeting. He had done so the night before Sunday night for weeks past. Every other day he had a fire in the stove, but he had neglected to check it. He was awakened by the smell of gas. He got up and checked the stove and found it was full of gas. He turned it off and the gas went out. The three children were saved.

Haggarty, wife of the captain of the whaler, who arrived here from Rio de Janeiro on the steamer Italian Prince. The whaling vessel put into the sea January 20 of its crew had died of smallpox and the 27 remaining members of the crew frantically labored the vessel, which they declared had been cursed.

OBITUARY.

James Reid Robson. The sudden death of Mr. James Reid Robson, aged 60 years in New York City on Wednesday, came as a severe shock to his friends and acquaintances in and around the vicinity of his former home, Glenora, near Galt, as well as in the vicinity of Buffalo, N.Y., where he had lived for several years. He was the youngest son of James W. and Edwin, and Miss Annie C. Geddes of this city; besides a little child, a wife, the youngest son of the late James W. Robson, and one year respectively. Interment will take place on Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 14, from the family residence, near Glenora, to the village cemetery.

Church Nearly Burned.

Belleve, Feb. 12.—The Methodist Church at Foxboro, near this city, had a very narrow escape from destruction by fire yesterday morning. The caretaker had the several stoves going and in one of the rooms was a large box stove in which there was a roaring fire. In its absence one of the stoves became overheated and the sparks escaping set fire to the floor and woodwork. The escaping smoke drew the attention of neighbors and they hurriedly extinguished the fire by hand work.

Almed at Jap Fishermen.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Japanese fishermen are the special target at which the Canadian hunt is directed. The representative of the Canadian fishing industry in Alaska waters is almost everywhere today in support of this bill, and stated very frankly that the Japanese are so near to Alaska waters and so extensively engaged in fishing that some law to check their activity is required.

Twenty-Seven Cars Burned.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Feb. 12.—The cars belonging to the International Railway Company, located near the Whirlpool on the Canadian side, were destroyed by fire between 1 and 2 o'clock this morning. A snow plow and twenty-seven cars were burned. The car loss included all the summer cars of the Niagara Belt Line, and those of the International Railway. The fire was outside the water limits.

Ex-Alemerman Drops Dead.

Montreal, Feb. 12.—The late French-Canadian business man of the city, M. Lefebvre, one of the best known French-Canadian business men of the city, died at his home in Montreal this morning as he was entering a notary's office on a business engagement. Mr. Lefebvre's principal business was that of a vinegar manufacturer.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable) London, Feb. 12.—Bruce Walker, the Canadian government agent, speaking to the Canadian Associated Press, said the coming season in Scottish emigration to Canada already gives the strongest evidence of being greatly beyond anything known in the past history of the movement from Scotland. The great majority of those who have sailed are either going to friends or are capitalists going out to prospect locations in the Northwest.

RESENTS PASTOR'S REMARKS.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—A sensational incident occurred in the Presbyterian Church Sunday morning, Rev. J. W. McLeod referred to the movement to secure a license for the making of harbor mattresses and said any man or woman who signed such a petition was not a Christian. Ex-Mayor Geo. Turner promptly arose in his pew, and addressing the preacher, said: "I want to say to you, Mr. McLeod, that I am one of those who signed the petition to re-open the harbor for the making of harbor mattresses. I have good reasons for doing so, and I want to say that I consider myself just as good a Christian as anyone in this church."
