SPANISH TROOPS FOR HOME

Departure From Porto Rico of Soldiers
Both Sick and Well.

Thousands of People Congregated
at the Wharf to See Them off,
But There Was No Riotous
Demonstration—The Troops Re-
joiced at the Prospect of Going

San Juan, Island of Porto Rico, Sept. 21.
The repatriation of the Spanish soldiers
begins today. Four hundred men, of whom
two hundred were sick and 200 belonged to
the engineer corps, sailed for Havre on
board the French steamer Chateau Lafite.
Eight hundred infantry will sail to-mor-
row on the steamer San Francisco.

sands of people when the Spanish en-
gineers marched down to the music of
the Spanish quickstep to the wharf, where
they were received by Captain-General
Munoz and General Ortega. The Captain-
General did not make a speech, but he
shook hands with the officers and men.

Admiral Cervera to transport to Spain the
Spanish sailors captured at the battle of
Santiago, who were recently released by
the United States authorities, arrived here
to-day from Portsmouth, N.H., which place
he left on Sept. 12. Captain Balata, the
first commander of the Spanish cruiser
Vizcaya, and the other Spanish naval offi-
cers landed and were mistaken for a party
of which Admiral Cervera was a member.
The latter, however, was still on board the

lowed the officers and cheered for Admiral
Cervera. Captain Balata refused to make
any statement for publication, declining to
recount what he had to say for the court-
martial.

PICQUART ON TRIAL

Charged With Revealing Documents
Concerning the National
Defences—Colonel's Statement.

Paris, Sept. 21.—The trial of Colonel
Picquart and M. Lachaze, a lawyer, on
the charge of revealing documents con-
cerning the national defence, commenced
to-day before the correctional
tribunal, but the public prosecutor asked
for an adjournment on the ground
that the prosecution of Colonel Picquart
on the charge of forgery and using forged
documents had been ordered by the
Minister of War, M. Lachaze, who was
counsel for M. Zola during the latter's
famous trial, indignantly opposed the
adjournment, which he said, was an at-
tempt to hand over Colonel Picquart
into the clutches of the military authori-
ties.

Col. Picquart then rose and made a
statement which caused a sensation.
He said: "This is, perhaps, the last
I shall speak in public. I shall
leave the city in order to be ready to
clear that if I am found there with the
strange Col. Picquart. I wish to de-
clare that I have no idea of com-
mitting suicide."

The audience was intensely moved
and shouted "Vive Picquart."
The judges, however, after a short
deliberation, decided to indefinitely ad-
journ the case and Colonel Picquart
was led away between two policemen.
