On the Statement of Lansdowne That Military Preparations Were Behind Boer Diplomacy.

Berlin, Nov. 3 .- The statement of the Marquis of Lansdowne, at the Cutiers' feast in Sheffield yesterday that the military preparations in the difficulty with the Transvaal could not be kept abreast of the diplomatic negotiations, has evoked severe comment on the part of the German press.
