MINISTER'S HOUSE ENTERED

Burglars Made a Haul of Rev. W. F. Wilson's Home While He Was at a Picnic.

TWO OF MIDWAY GANG ARRESTED

Officers English Assailed While Trying to Arrest Man Running OR WITH A HORSE.

Hamilton, July 18.—While Rev. W. F. Wilson was away at a picnic this afternoon, his premises were entered and a number of articles were stolen.

Joseph Fitzpatrick, address unknown, was arrested to-night for assaulting P. C. English. It appears Fitzpatrick was trying to get away with a man's horse and rig, when the officer grappled with him. He put up a stiff fight.

The first race of the season for the Hamilton Bicycle Club medal took place to-night over the Stony Creek course. Cameron (scratch) won, Roy Miller (4 minutes) was second, and L. Thompson third. Time 30.12.

Police Court Items. John J. Sullivan, a former traveler for E. T. Wright & Co., was charged in the Police Court to-day with having obtained \$300 by fraud from the firm. He was remanded until next Wednesday for trial.

George Southwell, charged with arson, was committed for trial. Violet Marcey and Fannie Capes were charged with vagrancy. The former was remanded until Tuesday, and the latter was sent to the Mercer reformatory for six months.

John English, who admitted having Indian blood in his veins, was given three months in the Central Prison for stealing a bicycle.

Possible Hotel Manager. The negotiations for the purchase of the Osborne Hotel, are off. It would appear, however, that a manager has been found in the person of Frank Howe, proprietor of the Manhattan restaurant, on Merrick-street. Mr. Howe has submitted a proposal to Mr. Patterson that it is believed will meet with the latter gentleman's approval, and he will probably take possession of the hotel on Monday.

Troubles of a Baby. Judge Snider presided at the ninth Division Court this morning. One of the fifteen cases on the list was Rankin v. Ollman, a similar suit to one tried about a year ago. Mrs. Rankin sued George Ollman for \$100 for the keep of her daughter's baby. She placed the value of her services and the provision for the child, at \$2 a week, and she thought this reasonable, babies being more difficult to look after than grown people. The baby is a year and a half old, she said.

The judge reserved decision. Postmaster Adam Brown says the government is supplying the various cities with newspaper mail boxes, according to the necessities of each case in each city, as fast as possible, and he expects to see a number of boxes added soon to those already established in Hamilton. There are eight of the boxes in this city and more will be put in a few months, Mr. Brown thinks. He says the citizens need not expect to see newspaper boxes in numbers in this city as the letter boxes are, this being regarded as out of the question.

Tail Road Arbitration. Representatives of Barton Township and Council, members of the County Good Roads Committee, waited on

Judge Snider at noon to-day with reference to the toll roads arbitration question. His honor was asked to ratify the agreement made between the county and township representatives for the purchase of the Ancaster toll road at \$10,000. The price originally offered for it was \$12,000.

The judge did so, and he practically made an award in the case, just as he would have done had the value of the road been arbitrated on.

A CORRECTION. The World has received a notice from the solicitor of Miss Nellie Bennett, complaining that The World published in their news columns on July 4 an item to the effect that the adopted daughter of James Bennett had eloped with a married man and taken with her \$75 belonging to her foster parents, which is not true, neither is it true that the couple were arrested, or that the man will be prosecuted, or that the World published the item, which was copied from one of the Woodcock papers. Under the circumstances, The World regrets having published the item and apologizes to the complainant.

LAST DAY OF THE REUNION. Great Sport Provided for Visitors to Tassie Sem-Centennial. Galt, July 18.—The second day's program of entertainment for the Old Boy's reunion and semi-centennial celebration of Galt Collegiate Institute opened this morning by excursion trips on the street railway to Preston mill, along the springs, Idylwild Park and Heslop.

The attendance to-day was greatly augmented by new arrivals. Evidence of hearty welcome on the part of the citizens generally are everywhere apparent, flags and bunting on public buildings, places of business and private residences being conspicuously and profusely displayed. A garden party in charge of the Ladies' Committee was held in the afternoon on the grounds of the Collegiate Institute grounds. Several thousands attended, and many of whom went by trolley. The most of company furnished a 15-minute service for two hours during the afternoon, and ex-pupils, after which the prizes won in the various sports were distributed.

The closing and biggest event of the reunion, however, was the banquet held in the evening at the hotel, commencing at 8 o'clock to-night. The attendance, including occupants of the gallery, is estimated at 400. The program, which exceeded the most sanguine expectations of all concerned.

POSSE SIX HOURS BEHIND. Black Diamond, Wash., July 18.—Tracy has escaped to one of his hideouts. He has eluded the Sheriff of King County, and many picked men, who had advanced on his hiding place three miles from here, last night.

The posse reached Tracy's lair six or eight hours after he had fled. He had taken a rowboat and gone to the east lawyer lake, presumably about 2 o'clock this morning, accompanied by his two confederates. Sheriff Childre and the posse returned to Black Diamond this afternoon. The chase from this point has been abandoned.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY COWHIDE. Charlotte, N.C., July 18.—United States District Attorney A. F. Holton was cowhided in Winston this afternoon, and a count of ex-Congressman Thomas Settle, one of the leading Southern Republicans. The assault was the result of some harsh language used by Mr. Holton toward Williams in court over a year ago.

The men met in a store this afternoon and Williams demanded of Holton a retraction. Holton refused to make what Williams considered an apology, whereupon Williams drew a horsewhip and lashed Holton several times across the face and shoulder. The blows across the face brought
