## KAISER IS ROBBING **SEVERAL FRONTS TO** MEET ITALIAN PUSH

Says Profiteering No Worse Heavy Reinforcements Being Rushed to Support of Austrians.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—Alarmed by the success of the Italian drive over the Bainsizza Plateau, Germany is withdrawing large numbers of Austrian troops from France and from Galicia and Bukowina and rushing them to the Italian front to meet the renewed offeasive of Gen. Cadorna. Official dispatches received here from Rome today says the second phase of the great battle is about to open. Great as was the Italian victory on the plateau, the battle there is by no means finished, according to today's dispatch. Only the first phase of the campaign is past and the Italian troops are now preparing for a resumption of the action on a greater scale. The Austrians, aware of the Italian purpose are making ready a strong defensive.

# **EX-LONDONER NEVER** APPOINTED DEPUTY

ALL OF OFFERING Denies Story of Ex-Chief Howard of Peterboro.

Former London Fireman Declares Re Had Position Now Denied Him.

Notwithstanding a statement from Provincial Fire Marshal E. P. Heaton to the effect that ex-Fire Chief William Howard of Peterboro, and formerly of this city, had not been appointed as a deputy provicial fire marshal, Mr. Howard still maintains that he did receive the appointment. If the appointment has been cancelled, it is hinted that it might be due to political influences after the appointment was announced.

Following the announcement; made last Saturday, that the ex-Peterboro chief had been appointed a deputy fire marshal, the Peterboro Examiner telegraphed to Fire Marshal Heaton. That official absolutely denied that he had any knowledge of the appointment. Ex-Chief Howard was again asked if the statement of his appointment had been correct and replied in the affirmative.

For some time the ex-London fireman has been the storm centre in municipal affairs in the eastern city. Charges were made against him, and an official probe into his conduct and into the management of the fire department was ordered. Just as the special meeting of the council to hear these charges was convened the resignation of the chief was placed before it, and the probe was dropped. The council, however, insisted that the resignation take effect at once.

This surprise-resignation was followed by the announcement of Mr. Howard's appointment to the provincial department at a salary of \$3,600 a year, of \$2,000 more than he received in Peterboro. This announcement in turn has been followed by the official denials of the ex-Londoner's appointment.
