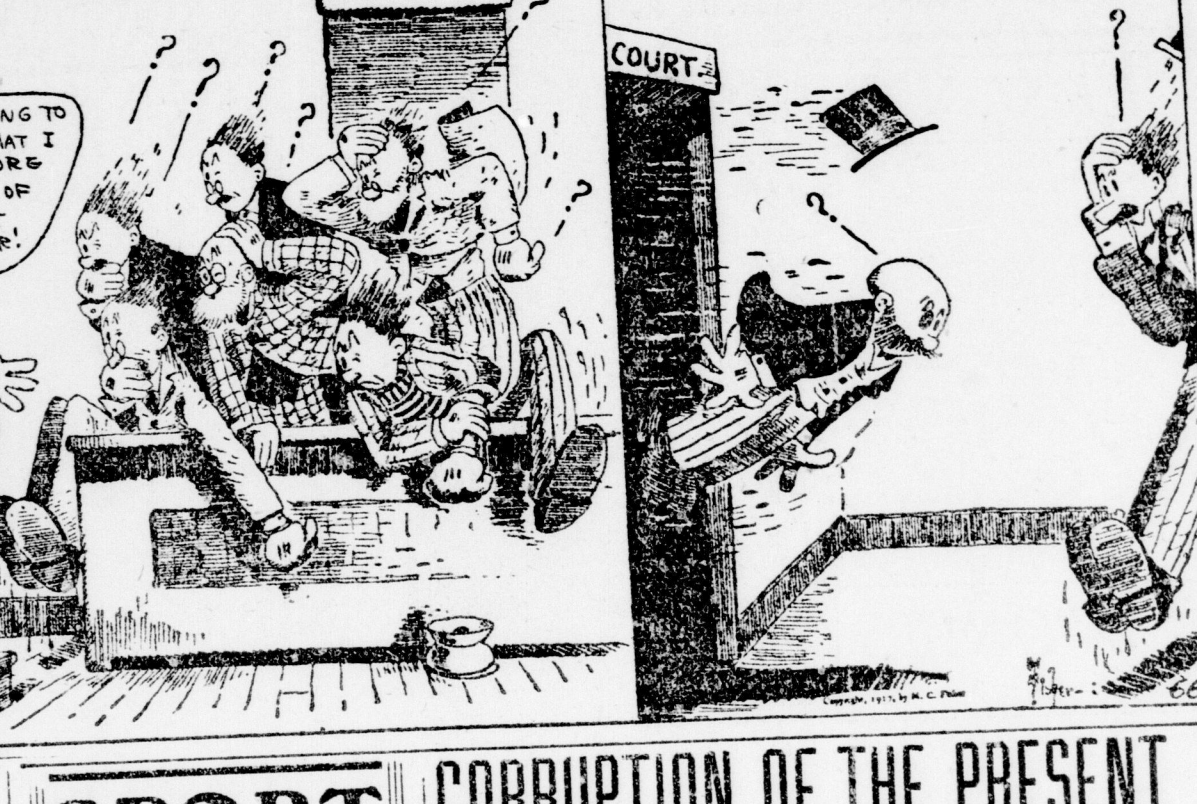


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HOCKEY SITUATION TO CLEAR UP THIS WEEK

INVESTIGATION MAY
RESULT IN FIRST
CHARGE OF KIND

Procuring" Section of Code
May Be Invoked.

William Anderson and his wife Dorothy of Boston, Mass., were remanded to jail for one week by Magistrate Graydon, when they were arraigned in police court today on charges of vagrancy.

Inquiries will be made in the meantime and upon the information will depend action in laying a charge of "procuring" against Anderson. Information was laid against Anderson under this section of the code today, but was amended to vagrancy upon the advice of the district attorney.

A soldier was in the court room to give evidence to the effect that Anderson had approached him and suggested a plan in which Anderson's wife was to be the other party.

If the charge of procuring is laid it will be first tried in a London court. The penalty provided in case of conviction is up to five years.

Mrs. Anderson, a young woman less than 20 years, presented a pathetic sight as she told the magistrate that she came to the police station on Sunday because she had no place to go.

Anderson, in pleading not guilty, said that he and his wife had arrived in Canada in July, and had travelled ever since, coming to London a few weeks ago. He had only worked a day and a half since his arrival. He stated that the reason he had not worked more was because he was unable to stand hard work.

As the magistrate remanded Anderson to jail a week, the latter forgot his weakened condition and asked to be allowed a chance to work, announcing that he was strong and healthy and could work anywhere willing to work at any kind of employment. His admission came too late, and he was remanded to permit of a record being thoroughly investigated.
